## Old Landmarks To Pass



Another step in the march of progress will be marked by the removal of these old buildings at 11th and High streets, now open to bid. These structures were put up in 1908, as headquarters for the U. S. bureau of reclamation when it was first set up in Klamath Falls.

## Old USBR Building To Be Moved From Canal Site

Buildings on the original site of the U. S. bureau of reclamation headquarters in Klamath Falls at 11th and High are up for bid and are to be removed from the location.

What becomes of the buildings after February 4, when the bids are opened, is up to the successful bidders. Their purpose when they were put up in 1908 when the USBR was first set up here was to house the administrative offices and equipment of the bureau.

R. S. Hopkins, irrigation manager, recalls when he came here in 1923, two horses used by the bureau were kept in the barn at the site. The barn was later turned into a garage. The old buggy used was used to store material such as cement.

After headquarters were moved to the federal building in 1932, the office building at the old site burned and was never rebuilt. The other buildings were used as shops for repairing bureau equipment and as store rooms.

Until the bureau moved its offices to the airport just about a year ago, this was the set-up. There was plenty of spare and buildings to be used for shops and storehouses at the airport and all belongings were moved out there.

After that there was no reason to maintain the buildings at the original site and they have been put up for bid.

When the structures are removed from the location, as required of the bidder, the chain-link fence will be set back from the High street bank to the right-of-way on the canal and the property will be disposed of, also by bids probably.
