W. Ray Lamb, 1976 Huron, is chief stockholder and president of this plant and the one in Salinas, Calif. The two other stockholders, Charles M. Patterson of Salinas and Dr. Harold Porter of Los Gatos, Calif., were in Klamath Falls for the tests. The machinery was installed and tested by Claire Clark, erector for the Liquid Carbonic company, Los Angeles, assisted by Don Newcomb of the same company.

Two Years Ago  
Construction on the present plant was started just about two years ago and was completed about a year ago. Machinery on order for the plant has just now been delivered. The old bottling plant, located at 535 Spring, was operated since 1939 by Lamb and before that by Andy Collier.

This plant serves all Klamath and Lake counties and Dorris and Tulelake in California.

Frank Heath, plant and sales manager for the new set-up, came here from the Salinas plant in April, 1947. His wife is with him and they have purchased a home at 535 Johnson. The plant will operate with a crew of 12 including the bottling force and the sales staff. Lamb and his wife will handle the office work.

Lamb plans on having an "open house" at the new building in about one month when the plant will be run at night to show the public how its soft drink is put up.

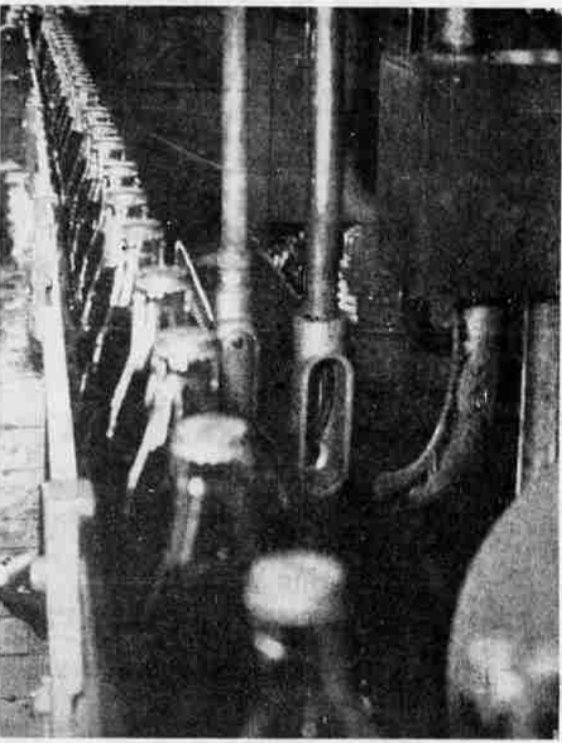

## L. A. Baker Elected To AFL Office

Larry A. Baker, member of the Typographical union, local No. 691, was elected and installed as president of the Central Labor Council (AFL) for 1948 at a meeting of the council last night at the Labor temple.

## Blast Kill's NY Producer

NEW YORK, Jan. 23 (AP)—Max Jellin, 40-year-old theatrical producer, was killed yesterday in a terrific explosion which police said was touched off by fumes pouring from four open gas jets in the kitchen of his luxurious mid-Manhattan apartment.

The blast, heard for blocks, wrecked the showman's apartment, damaged two others on the same floor and shook up occupants of the 18-story residential building at 300 East 87th street.

The official police report listed Jellin's death as "apparently suicide." Authorities continued their investigation.
