

Drive Chairman Is Guest Speaker

Soroptimists enjoyed hearing Dorothea Buck, chairman of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis in Klamath county, give some of the highlights of this year's campaign at the luncheon meeting held Thursday at the Pelican party room. Mrs. Buck recounted the intensive work being done by the national research program in which they are searching for a preventive of infantile paralysis, and also new treatment.

The death rate of infantile paralysis is usually five to 10 per cent of those stricken, according to Mrs. Buck. However, Klamath county had a much higher rate this past year, that of 23 per cent, due to the cases here being of the bulbar type.

Mrs. Buck stressed that the foundation needs money to continue these studies and wants the interest of people in helping to protect their community. The better educated the families are concerning the early symptoms of the disease and the knowledge about simple health precautions to follow, the more able they will be to combat the spread of infantile paralysis, she said.

Mrs. Buck was introduced to the club by Isabelle Brinker, program chairman for the day.

The musical program was introduced by Eloise McIntyre and consisted of two violin solos played by Athena Lampropoulos, accompanied by Catherine Hlanas. The numbers were very much enjoyed by the club.
