Red Cross Plan

Lots of babies are on their way, and lots of babies means lots of nighties, diapers, bands and shirts are going to be needed around here pretty soon.

The Klamath County chapter of the American Red Cross now has on hand plenty of little garments, cut out and ready for distribution, and if anyone can spare a few hours, the Red Cross will be very happy to have them lend a hand.

The layettes are only for veterans' wives or for wives of men who are in the active service of the country. It was observed today that veterans going to school have little money for the purchasing of nice layettes and that the Red Cross is going to see to it that the newcomer is well outfitted. All that is needed now is help.

Mrs. Gordon McCracken has accepted the position as production chairman of the Klamath chapter. She is responsible for the purchasing of material, distribution, cutting, packaging and bundling.

Layettes include two nightgowns, one bonnet, two pair of booties, two garterdes, one jacket, one dozen diapers, two shirts and two bands. Anyone interested may call the Red Cross, telephone No. 7184, next week and they will be handed or even mailed, just as many articles as they can turn out.

An interested group of women were at the Red Cross rooms this week, sewing on already cut garments.

The Red Cross reported a problem. There is on hand a supply of girls' dresses, in the 9 to 12 age group, for European relief. The dresses, although of attractive material, do not appeal to the local needle women who have said they much prefer to work on the little garments of a layette. These relief garments, however, are badly needed overseas and if any woman in Klamath county will call the Red Cross office, the material, all cut, will be delivered.

Members of the Klamath Falls Garden club will make mung trees

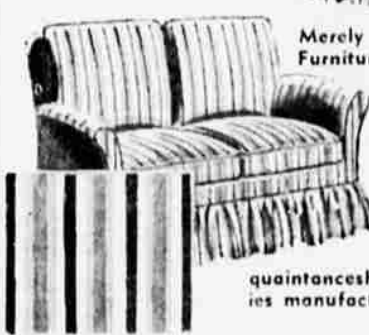
at the next meeting of the group, planned for Monday, February 2, in the city library clubrooms. Motion pictures will also be shown.

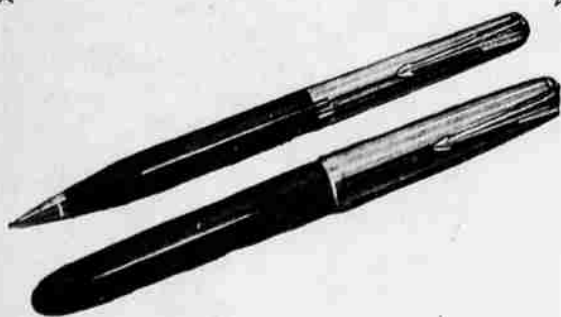
