## Basin Area Rancher Dies

Robert W. Steele, well-known rancher of the Klamath basin, passed away at 12:45 p. m. Sunday at Hillside hospital following an illness of several months. He had been in failing health for the last five years.

Mr. Steele was born October 28, 1874, in Toronto, Canada, son, and one of 12 children of Nicholas and Isabella Steele.

The family came to Oregon when he was nine years of age, settling near Monmouth. He was married October 26, 1898, at Corvallis, to Helen Josephine Heckler of Albany and in 1905, Mr. and Mrs. Steele moved to Twin Falls, Ida., where until February, 1931, he was closely associated with the agricultural development of that irrigated project.

He invented the Steele sagebrush grubber which was widely used in the clearing of land for farming on that project. In 1931, Mr. and Mrs. Steele came to the Klamath country, settling at Merrill, where they lived until his death. They farmed the J. Frank Adams' ranch there, later acquiring ranch holdings at Malin. They farmed also at Tulelake and two years ago, with their son, J. R. Steele, purchased the L. O. Mills' ranch in the Pine Grove district near Klamath Falls.

He was interested in the development of the seed potato industry during the time he lived here and is credited with assisting to maintain the high quality of seed produced in this basin. Mr. and Mrs. Steele would have celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary next October.

He was a member of St. Augustine's Catholic church of Merrill and a member of the Knights of Columbus lodge at Twin Falls. Surviving are his wife, Helen J. Steele of Merrill, one son, Joseph R. Steele, Klamath Falls, one granddaughter, Dolores Helen Steele, three sisters, Mrs. Isabella Hildebrand, Salem; Mrs. Daisy Owenbaugh, San Francisco, Calif.; and Mrs. Effie Andrew, Salem, also one brother, Donald D. Steele, Salem.

Funeral services will be held at 10 a. m. Thursday at St. Augustine's church, Merrill, with Father J. O'Connor reading the burial service. The rosary for repose of his soul will be said at the Whitlock parlors, Wednesday night at 8 o'clock. The body will be shipped to Portland for commitment services at 2 p. m. Friday, and vault entombment in the family plot in Lincoln Memorial park.

## Two Hurt In Auto Wreck

Two young Klamath men were painfully cut and bruised at midnight Saturday when their car overturned on a curve near Merrill when the driver said he was blinded by lights of an oncoming machine.

In Hillside hospital, treated for head and facial lacerations and chest injuries, is William Long Jr., 23-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. William Long, 4512 Crosby. Long is a Southern Pacific brakeman and a navy veteran.

Treated at Hillside and dismissed as "Leand Blind, 22, 4524 S. 6th, driver of the car. Blind had facial cuts and a badly bruised leg. The two were en route to Merrill at the time. Blind's car is said to have met three oncoming cars, the first in the string dimming the lights, but the second, which Blind met on a curve at the Hannon starch factory, falling to dim. Blind said he overshoot the curve and the car turned completely over, landing in the borrow pit. Passing motorists brought the two into Klamath Falls. Blind is employed by his father.
