Mrs. James Parsley was absent from school on Tuesday.

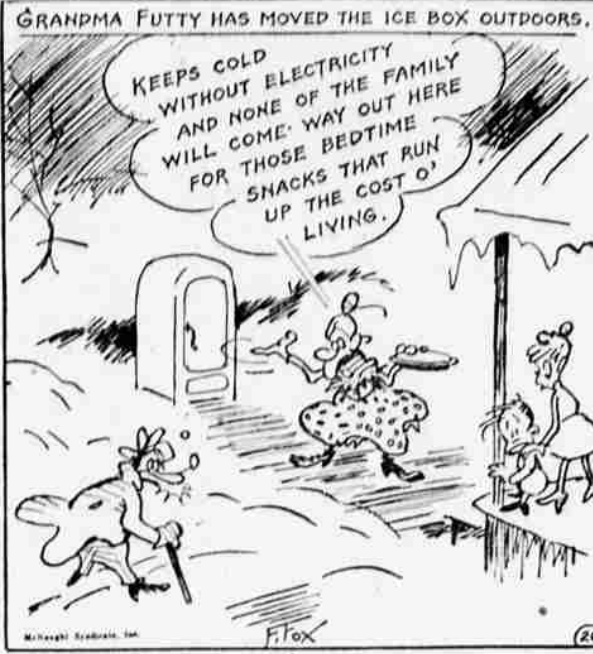

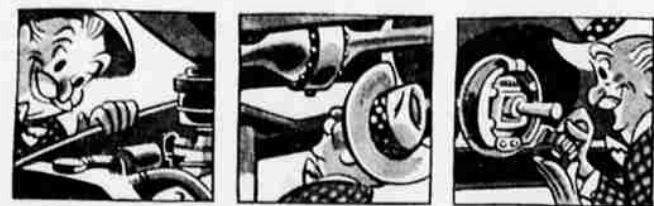
