# Wreck Victims Bodies Seen

SEATTLE, Jan. 26 (AP)—A coast guard amphibious plane awaited clear weather at Annette island, near Ketchikan, Alaska, today, the coast guard said, to check a Canadian fisherman's report that the bodies of two crewmen of the ill-fated army transport Clarksdale Victory have washed ashore on Hippa island.

The fisherman, Albert Duffy, told Queen Charlotte, B. C., police yesterday he sighted the bodies last Monday. The actions of birds, he said, indicated other victims may have floated onto the beach.

The Clarksdale Victory ran aground on Hippa island last November 24 and broke up in heavy seas. Four of the 53-man crew were rescued and the bodies of four others were found several days later.
