## Electric Motor Theft Reported

Three electric motors, all one horsepower, were stolen from the R. A. Campbell potato cellar near Olene in the past few days, Deputy Sheriff Marion J. Barnes reported today.

Two of the motors belonged to Campbell, the other to Basil Brown. One was a General Electric, the other two were Westinghouse manufacture.

Barnes said apparently the thieves drove up to the cellar in a truck, took the motors off their mountings and hauled them away. They are valued at about \$50 each. Also taken was about 25 feet of extension cord.

## Alley Paving Out Window

In answer to requests for paving alleys in the city, Councilman A. F. Condrey said today that city-financed paving is not even a remote possibility at this time because of the Bancraft act covering street improvement.

Condrey said that the law provides that improvements for alleys must come from property owners. He said the city will grade alleys if property owners will finance the grading.

He said that he has contacted rock companies in town who said the approximate cost to each property owner will be \$12.50. He urged that property owners take steps to gravel the alleys.

Condrey added that the city urges property owners on unpaved streets to petition the council for paving. Ten signers from each block is necessary. He said the city wants to get its year's paving project lined up and would like to hear from property owners now.

## Grand Jury Probes Murder

The Klamath county grand jury returned to active session today and the first case taken up was that of James Elza Wyatt, accused of killing Robert Theodore Melias at a railroad jungle shanty last Friday.

Wyatt is formally charged with second degree murder, but District Attorney Clarence A. Humble said he did not want to rule out the possibility of the charge being changed to first degree murder on an indictment.

Several witnesses to the wine party and ensuing fatal shooting were being questioned by the grand jury today, including Henry Nelson, Joe Butler, Ray Wilson and George Richa. Butler and Richa are held in the county jail on drunk sentences, while Wilson is booked for vagrancy.

Also a witness in the case is Jim Sullivan, who was within 10 feet of Wyatt and Melias at the time of the shooting and who disappeared before he could be questioned Friday. He was located yesterday morning by state police.
