American To Run Bus Line

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 27 (AP)—American Bus Lines, Inc., will operate the Dollar Bus Lines if the U. S. district court, a federal division and an Oregon state agency approve.

Dollar Lines operates from San Francisco to Portland, Ore., with intrastate rights in Oregon between Portland and Eugene. It was purchased yesterday by American for \$26,000 at an open sale.

Sale of Dollar Lines was ordered by the U. S. district court on complaint of the federal anti-trust division that it was being run as a "second rate service." Named in the complaint were Pacific Greyhound Lines, Greyhound Corp., Southern Pacific Co., Interstate Transit Lines, Interstate Transit Lines, Inc., and Union Pacific States, Inc.

The purchase by American is subject to confirmation by the federal court and approval of the interstate commerce commission and the Oregon public utilities commission.

American, which operates from New York, Philadelphia and Washington to San Diego, Los Angeles and San Francisco, recently sought unsuccessfully to extend its service from San Diego to the California-Oregon state line via US 101.

Beer Drinking Cows Sets Record

LONDON, Jan. 27 (AP)—Bride Birch, a beer-drinking Friesian cow, is the world's biggest milk producer, her owner says.

R. A. Pierson, of Meadown Farm, Ringwood, said that on a diet including a half gallon of stout a day, Bride Birch gave 41,952 pounds of milk for 329 days ended last night. Pierson said the record for 365 days, held by an American Holstein Friesian, was 41,943.

Germany Buys Up U. S. Surplus Goods

FRANKFURT, Germany, Jan. 27 (AP)—U. S. army surplus stocks which originally cost about one billion dollars were sold Monday to Germany for approximately \$236,000,000, official officials announced.

The purchase was officially described as "an important pump primer in getting essential German services and industries back on their feet." It will be paid out for future German exports.

Freezing Weather Ruins Egg Cargo

NEWCOMERTOWN, O., Jan. 27 (AP)—Robert Reynolds of Newark, O., lost \$26,000 worth of eggs yesterday when his truck was disabled in below zero weather after a collision with another truck.

State highway patrolmen said the truck, when moving, jiggled the liquid, but that they froze when the truck was disabled for four hours.

Ex-Officer Loses Out In Battle

DETROIT, Jan. 27 (AP)—A former army pilot who bought a Swiss watch from a fellow American in a German prison camp and later traded it for rations was under

court order today to pay the original owner \$100.

Dizziness Sign of Disease

One of the most common types of dizzy spells is called Meniere's syndrome. This term is used to describe a set of symptoms in which there are attacks of dizziness, ringing in the ears, and gradually increased difficulty in hearing.

Meniere's syndrome is used rather loosely to cover several different kinds of diseases of the inner portions of the ear, the symptoms of which are much alike. Among the causes of this condition are infection, tumors, injuries and fractures. There is also a condition, which is responsible for most cases, stemming from the accumulation of fluid, or dropsy, in the deep portion of the ear, called the labyrinth.

This dropsical condition does not develop in young people, but becomes more common after the age of 45. It may involve both ears. Actually, the attacks of dizziness generally bother patients more than the ringing, or even the loss of hearing.

The treatment of Meniere's syndrome, not due to accumulation of fluid or dropsy, depends on what can be done for the original cause. In the case of Meniere's disease of the dropsical variety, the problem is difficult. Many victims find that drinking a lot of fluid tends to bring on an attack. As a result, some forms of treatment are aimed at reducing the intake of fluid, or trying to remove as much fluid from the body as possible.

Surgery Employed

In addition, several medical treatments have been favored. Surgery is also employed with success in some cases, but not in others. Sur-

gical treatment is liable to bring some, but not complete, relief. Unless people fail, as a result of dizziness, and hurt themselves, Meniere's syndrome is more annoying and uncomfortable than it is dangerous. This form of dizziness does not interfere with activities or bodily functions, except those related to balance and hearing.

Question: How can a tattoo be removed from the skin?
Answer: The most popular method involves tattooing tannic acid into the mark, just enough to avoid bleeding, and then rubbing silver nitrate over the area until it becomes black. The black crust separates in about 16 days. Whatever method is used should be employed by an expert.

Taft Backers Push Race

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27 (AP)—The decision of Harold E. Stassen to take on Senator Robert A. Taft in the Ohio's home state found Taft supporters ready Monday to force an even earlier test of sentiment for the republican presidential nomination.

They disclosed plans to make an all-out race in Taft's behalf in the April 13 Nebraska free-for-all. That test comes three weeks ahead of the Ohio balloting which Stassen announced he will enter.

Taft himself was silent on the Nebraska development, but he left no doubt that he welcomes the competition on his own grounds where, he insists, Stassen "has no chance for success."

The former Minnesota governor said in his week-end announcement that he has a high regard for Taft and would have preferred the test to come in some other state.

"But," Stassen added, "the differences between us on both foreign and domestic policy represent the major issues within the republican party and before the country. It is important that the people have an opportunity to express their views upon these policies prior to the national convention next June."

In saying that Ohio appears to afford the only opportunity for such a test, Stassen apparently had in mind that just about everybody who amounts to anything in the GOP presidential contest is likely to find his name on the Nebraska preferential ballot.

HOLLYWOOD, Jan. 27 (AP)—Film Actress Linda Christian is on what she terms a "well-earned vacation" today.

The red-haired starlet, latest girlfriend of Actor Tyrone Power, said last night that her year-long campaign to secure a release from Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer studios was over.

Studio officials claimed her from the rolls Saturday, claiming the action resulted from her refusal to accept a part in a picture.

"That is not true," rebutted the Mexico City beauty. "I have begged for a release for a year. The studio saw that I was unhappy and decided to make me happy by releasing me."

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
