CIO Man Hits Both Parties

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27 (AP)—A spokesman for a big CIO union asserted today both the democratic administration and the republicans congress have been "seriously delinquent" in fighting inflation.

Russ Nixon, Washington representative of the United Electrical, Radio and Machine Workers, told the senate banking committee price controls should be restored immediately.

Along with them, he said, should go "power to allocate ration and pay subsidies to producers, especially farmers, where necessary to assure production at reasonable profit."

Nixon, who said he spoke in behalf of 600,000 members of the union, criticized President Truman for asking only "stagnant" price control powers, "as though this problem were an 'iffy' matter."

He called the administration's anti-inflation bill "a feeble, too little, too late, complacent approach to an urgent problem."

BELOGRADE, Yugoslavia, Jan. 27 (AP)—The U. S. embassy said today the Yugoslav foreign ministry had assured it that Mrs. Emma Debeljak is not under death sentence.

Such reports have been printed in some U. S. newspapers.

Further details have been asked. The U. S. consulate said Mrs. Debeljak, a native of Farrell, Pa., has been in Yugoslavia since 1920. She has a daughter, 10, and a son, 9. She is divorced from her Yugoslav husband. A consulate spokesman said she had asked for an exit visa on her U. S. passport more than a year ago. The visa was not granted. The consulate received reports of her arrest some time ago.
