

# MARKETS and FINANCIAL WHEAT STAGES SMALL GAIN

CHICAGO, Jan. 28 (AP)—Severe cold weather in the winter wheat belt gave new crop contracts of the bread cereal a firm undertone on the board of trade today. Nearby deliveries scored smaller gains.

Price movements in corn were erratic. Substantially higher at the start, prices dropped below the preceding close around midday. Then a new buying movement developed and carried all quotations higher. Oats were somewhat weaker than corn.

Wheat closed 2 1/2-3 1/4 higher, May \$2.90-42.90, corn was 1 1/2-2 1/4 higher, May \$2.58-82.58 1/4, oats were 1/4 lower to 1 1/4 higher, May \$1.22 1/2-5 1/4, and soybeans were 1 cent lower to 1 cent higher, March \$4.11.

NEW YORK, Jan. 28 (AP)—The stock market rode a slowly rising tide today, putting together two successive advances for the first time in three weeks.

Demand for industrial shares revived, while railroad issues again scored general improvement. Oils and aircrafts showed occasional strength, and many closed at near the day's top prices. Total transfers were in the neighborhood of 900,000 shares. Final gains ranged to around 3 points and some scattered losers persisted.

## Relief Group Probe Planned

NEW YORK, Jan. 28 (AP)—The house un-American activities committee will study testimony involving alleged communist influences in New York city's multi-million dollar relief effort.

Mayor William O'Dwyer, announcing yesterday that the committee had requested the testimony, said it would be submitted "at the earliest possible moment."

The data was gathered by a four-man investigating committee named by Welfare Commissioner Benjamin Fielding. The inquiry, the mayor said, stemmed from charges by the civil service forum, an organization of city workers, that local 1 of the CIO United Public Workers of America "was communist controlled and was using union methods to obstruct the work" of the welfare department.

## Earthquake Still Shaking Iloilo

MANILA, Jan. 28 (AP)—20 additional aftershocks were reported today in the earthquake-battered city of Iloilo as the Central Philippine rechecked damage of \$3,500,000 to church properties alone and dispatches told of 200 houses destroyed by huge landslides.

The death toll was an unofficial 28, and two families were missing on Western Panny Island, of which Iloilo is the capital.

Latest tremors in Iloilo were described by the Philippines weather bureau as of moderate intensity. The first, at 1:55 a. m., lasted 25 seconds; the second, at 2:15 p. m., five seconds. The series of quakes began Sunday.

## Two Burn To Death In House Fire

GARDEN HOME, Jan. 28 (AP)—Two men burned to death early today in a small house in this community west of Portland.

William Rice, 68, the tenant, and Reinhart Scherner, about 49, visiting him, were the victims. Their bodies were found in the ruins.
