MANY VETS STUDY WHILE PATIENTS IN VA HOSPITALS

Many ill and disabled patients in Veterans Administration hospitals in the Pacific Northwest are making profitable use of their long hours in bed by studying correspondence courses ranging from high school English, mathematics and history to bookkeeping, farming and carpentry. Most of the 234 available courses have been obtained by the VA from the U. S. Armed Forces Institute.

The purpose of the educational program is to offer patients the opportunity to utilize their leisure hospital time to best advantage and at the same time provide them with an interest in activities other than hospital routine.

It also furnishes mental stimulation to replace the lack of physical activity, and provides patients with an academic or vocational background of particular value when they leave the hospital, either to continue education or to obtain employment.

The courses are available to patients only with the prescription of physicians.

VA REQUESTS COMPLETE INFORMATION IN LETTERS

The VA again requests that veterans include complete information in inquiries on their claims. This should include full name, address, service serial number, VA claim number or VA insurance policy number.

Nearly 20 per cent of all correspondence received by the Veterans Administration requires identification research in index files before answers can be given. Most delays in answering veterans' communications are attributed to this failure of letter writers to properly identify themselves.

Recent figures indicate that the Veterans Administration receives on the average nearly 15 million pieces of mail per month.

Undesirable Aliens Entering America

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28 (AP)—Rep. McDowell (R-Pa.) said today "an astonishing number" of undesirable aliens have been getting into the United States.

The Pennsylvanian is chairman of a house un-American activities subcommittee on fascism. He has made personal checks on conditions along the Mexican and Canadian borders.

At the moment, the subcommittee is trying to find out how Ferenc Vajta, wartime Hungarian consul in Vienna during the German occupation, entered this country.

McDowell told reporters he plans to expand the inquiry to determine whether there has been laxity in U. S. consular offices overseas or at immigration ports.

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
