### 'Drug Train' Proposed

NEWARK, N. J., Jan. 29 (AP)—A coast-to-coast "drug train" to collect medical supplies for Europe was a planned last night by the New Jersey Pharmaceutical association.

The group, in mid-winter convention, adopted a resolution proposing the nation's pharmacies become depots for collection of drugs and medicines needed overseas.

Dr. Ernest Little, president-elect of the American Pharmaceutical association and former dean of Rutgers college of pharmacy, promised support of the nation group.

If approved nationally, the plan would work this way:

The general public would contribute by donating 25 cents or more in collection boxes set up in pharmacies. Wholesale drug houses would supply the drugs at cost and turn them over to the national collection group, probably the American Pharmaceutical association.

### Orville Wright Said "Better"

DAYTON, O., Jan. 29 (AP)—Aviation pioneer Orville Wright "rested comfortably" during the night, his physician, Dr. A. B. Browder, said today.

Browder described Wright's condition as "more serious than we first believed." The co-inventor of the airplane was stricken with a heart attack Tuesday in his laboratory.

Since then, Browder said, Wright developed "quite a congestion of the right lung." He suffered a previous heart attack last October.

### Kaiser May Buy Continental Motors

BOSTON, Jan. 29 (AP)—President Joseph W. Frazer said Wednesday that Kaiser-Frazer corporation is negotiating for purchase of Continental Motors corporation Detroit plant for which Kaiser-Frazer announced last fall a planned two and a half million dollar expansion.

Frazer said in a news conference the buying was scheduled for "some time this spring" but did not disclose the price.

The Detroit plant has been under lease to Kaiser-Frazer and in announcing expansion the company said it planned to make there most of the engines for an estimated output of 1500 cars daily.

The president added that Kaiser-Frazer planned to continue to get additional engines from Continental's Muskegon, Mich., branch.

### Solon Demands Financial Show

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29 (AP)—The ator Elmer Thomas (D-Okla.) said Wednesday he will ask that all other senators "bare their personal finances as I have been forced to do."

Names of speculators brought out by the current senate investigation of commodity speculation have included those of Thomas, his wife, Mrs. Edith Thomas, and a secretary, Miss Beth Gage.

Thomas told a reporter he will ask the senate to adopt a rule that each senator must make a "sworn statement" of his financial and professional interests.

### Wheat Export Meeting Called

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29 (AP)—Representatives of more than 40 nations launched a new effort Wednesday to get major wheat exporting and importing nations to agree on a long-term program for stabilizing prices and markets of this breadgrain.

The conference (3 p. m. EST) was called by the international wheat council, which has been striving since late in the 30's to set up an agreement providing for export quotas and a system of maximum and minimum prices designated to protect both producers and consumers.

### Klamath Salesman Wins Award

Michael Boam, 1132 Main, Electrical agency salesman, was winner of a three-state contest recently conducted by the vacuum cleaning concern, and was awarded a lady's gold wristwatch and a gold trophy. Boam has been a Klamath resident since last June.

### DISTILLERS' RATION ENDS SATURDAY

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28 (AP)—The government's power to limit use of grain in whisky will end Saturday.

The house banking committee killed by a 12 to 9 vote yesterday a bill to continue the curbs through February.

Authority for the grain rationing through January 31 was part of the anti-inflation law passed during the 1947 special session. The senate voted last Friday to extend it another month.

The many friends of Paul and Mary Jane Sabo will be interested to learn they are showing improvement. Paul has been moved from Corvallis General hospital to the college infirmary, but Mary Jane's condition does not warrant moving her at this time. She was critically burned about the head, shoulders and both limbs. She was wearing a sweater at the time of the explosion and the material held the fumes. Both Paul and Mary Jane were badly burned about the eyes but Mrs. Sabo said today that neither would have their eyesight impaired as first thought. Both will be moved to Klamath Falls as soon as Mary Jane can travel. Mrs. Sabo plans to return north Saturday. She accompanied Mr. and Mrs. Sheldon Brumbaugh home today from Corvallis.

### Apartment House To Boost Rents

PORTLAND, Jan. 29 (AP)—Tenants of an apartment building here have received notices of rental increases from 4 to 20 per cent to be effective March 1, the day after expiration of federal rent controls.

D. A. Dryer, agent for owners of the Savoy apartments, said the tenants were given a choice of signing the leases or vacating in 30 days. The building has 42 apartments, including one occupied by James E. Fadling, Portland area rent advisory board member and CIO Woodworkers president.

Dryer said the increases asked were to cover over-all increases in operating costs of 36.7 per cent.

### Roads Get Repair Job

Clear, dry weather of the past two weeks made it possible for the maintenance crews of the Oregon state highway department in this district to do their patching jobs which are usually postponed until late spring, officials said here today.

Quite a few patches have been done on the Willamette pass but last summer's work of deepening and cleaning ditches along that stretch have prevented many of what the department calls "frost boils." These are caused by water seeping under the pavement, freezing, and then buckling.

"The Willamette pass is holding up much better this winter than last as many motorists have observed. Most of the work of the maintenance crews this winter has been in snow removal but even more in sanding frosty stretches along the major highways leading out of the Klamath basin.

### Bodies Carried From Crash Site

FRESNO, Calif., Jan. 29 (AP)—The bodies of 32 persons who perished when a chartered transport plane loaded with Mexican deportees crashed and buried yesterday were being brought out of Los Gatos canyon today.

The civil aeronautics authority early today began an investigation of the disaster which killed 28 Mexicans, three crew members, and a U. S. immigration service guard. There were no survivors.

Witnesses said an engine fire apparently set one wing ablaze, the wing tore off and the DC-3 plunged in flames.

Foreman Frank V. Johnson of a road work crew said he saw persons falling or jumping before the flaming aircraft crashed.

The plane was operated by Airline Transport Carriers, Burbank, Calif., under charter to the immigration service.
