

Growers To Hear Bemis Talk Friday

The potato crop from a national viewpoint and the outlook for 1948 will be told to the Tulelake Growers association at the membership meeting Friday.

Kris Bemis, secretary for the potato division of the United Fresh Fruits and Vegetables association of Washington, D. C., will talk to the group meeting at 7:30 p. m. at the Legion hall. Bemis was here on the same mission a year ago.

All growers and produce shippers throughout the entire Klamath basin are invited to attend this meeting. Charles A. Henderson, Klamath county agricultural agent, will speak on the local aspect of the potato crop.

Sam Anderson, newly installed president of the association, said today that growers will be given an opportunity at the meeting to make recommendations to the U. S. department of agriculture on re-signing the potato marketing agreement. Plans for this year's potato crop in the basin will also be taken up at the meeting.

All alumni in possession of these books are asked to bring them to the high school, where they will be purchased at a reasonable rate.

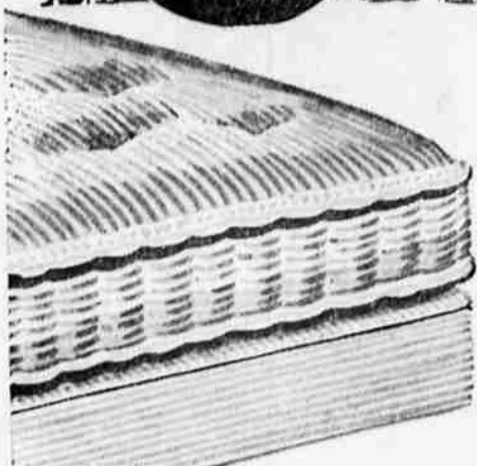
Bookstores give little hope of receiving enough of the textbooks to go around, and any assistance will be greatly appreciated, according to Woodhouse.
