

OVS Slates Courses In Home Arts

Citizens Ask Free Port Status

POINT ROBERTS, Wash., Jan. 30 (AP)—Describing themselves as "Canada's step-children," residents of this tiny wedge of U. S. territory planned a mass meeting today to demand that Point Roberts be made a free port of entry or that the area be annexed by Canada.

The mass meeting, planned for today, was called after U. S. customs and immigration officers began closing at 8 p. m.

The community's 200 residents said the closure amounts to virtual curfew because they are confined to their home area each evening unless they obtain a special permit to cross the border.

Point Roberts, at the end of a peninsula, became a virtual island when it was sliced off from Canada by establishment of the 49th parallel as the boundary line.

The AAA office staff has been working overtime compiling work on 1946 potato loans, completing performance reports and payment applications and approving 1948 final potato goals. All the reports and records must be transmitted to the state office by deadline, too.

Buelah Hyatt, in charge of office work, and the treasurer makes up the monthly expense account for the office staff and county and community committees. She checks reports and applications for payment, sends out notices on 1948 goals computing 1948 sugar beet applications for payment and has charge of incoming and outgoing mail.
