Stopped cars at the cross-lines protect the children from other cars coming up from behind. Packed snow was reported in the Cascade mountain passes today for the first time in two weeks, the state highway commission said in its 9 a. m. road report. One inch of new snow fell at O'Fall lake on the Willamette highway, where the temperature fell to 14 degrees. There was light snow on the roads, now being sanded, and roadside snow was registered at a depth of 44 inches. The men have gone to San Diego for 12 weeks of basic training. "January, 1948, has proven the best month for navy enlistments in Klamath basin since early 1946," Vernon Chitwood, CMM USN, in

charge of the recruiting station here, said today. During January, 19 men were processed here and sworn in at Portland. The next best month was December, 1947, with 18 men enlisting in the navy.

The larger portion of these enlistees are 17 and 18-year-olds, Chitwood explained and reasons given for enlisting are desires for navy technical training.
