## Fair Weather Forecast Here

## Former GI Fears War

NEW YORK, Jan. 30 (AP)—A former U. S. army sergeant who became a brigadier general in the fighting in Kashmir said today he believed the assassination of Gandhi might cause full-scale war in India.

The soldier, Russell K. Haight Jr., 26, of Denver arrived by plane today for Karachi.

Informed of the assassination, Haight said "the Hindus may blame it on the Moslems and that might start a full-scale war. They are just waiting to take over Pakistan."

He added that he believed the United States should follow a hands-off policy in the India fighting, commenting "they are trigger happy so we ought to let them alone."

The one-time sergeant, who wore an olive green uniform and a turban, declared he had entered the fighting with free Kashmir forces "for the hell of it." Asked if he was concerned with the issues, he replied "I couldn't care less."

## Oil Export Cut Ordered

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31 (AP)—The government Friday ordered an 18 1/2 per cent cut in exports of fuel oil and gasoline due to the "serious shortage" at home.

The action was taken by the commerce department which has power to limit exports of scarce things. It cut the amount of oil and gasoline it will let be exported during the first three months of this year from 11,850,000 barrels to 9,650,000 barrels.

There has been a clamor in congress to stop all shipments abroad except those going to U. S. military forces. Bills to do that have been introduced in house and senate.

The department announced it will also limit licenses for the overseas shipments of petroleum to exports from those areas of this country "where the fuel can best be spared during this emergency period."

It explained this means that if an oil company wants to ship from New England, where oil supplies are short, the license will be denied. But the firm could ship from California.

## Reds Continue Military Protests

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30 (AP)—A second Russian protest against American military moves in the Mediterranean has been received by the state department.

Officials said today the note is under study, but did not disclose what it says. The Moscow radio said it protests that the presence of American warships in Italian ports violates the new peace treaty with Italy.

Secretary Marshall is expected to reject outright an earlier Soviet protest against American plans to restore the strategically important wartime airfield at Meliaha in North Africa.

## New Plan Mapped For Greece

ATHENS, Jan. 31 (AP)—The U. S. aid mission announced Friday plans are being drafted to decentralize the Greek government.

Dwight P. Griswold, chief of the mission, told a news conference the plans call for division of the country into 12 districts, and for granting broader authority to local governments.

Griswold said he is encouraged by the situation at present. He said there is better agreement between his mission and the government now than at any previous time.
