Outstanding Meet Held By Group

One of the most outstanding meetings of the year was held Thursday by the Soroptimist club of Klamath Falls. The tables were beautifully decorated with Chinese figurines, pottery and ming trees which carried out the theme of the meeting.

Ida Odell told how the Soroptimist spirit of universal friendship is kept alive by our aid to women both here and abroad. One of the projects of the American Federation of Soroptimist clubs is aiding Chinese girls in training as nurses. In 1942 the Chinese contacts committee was established to direct the expenditure of \$20,000 contributed by Soroptimist clubs toward the training of Chinese nurses at Lanchow hospital in Kansu province to be called the Northwest School of Nursing. This is the only nurses training school in that section of China.

Mrs. Odell said that to date the money has been used for the purchase of a nursing library which replaced textbooks and medical reference books which were long obsolete. Now the library is completely up to date and is also being used by the doctors in that area. Showers have been built in the hospital for the use of the nurses, hospital equipment has been purchased, and a complete dietetic laboratory kitchen installed. This year the club contributions will be used for a nurses' dormitory.

Soroptimists present at the meeting made their contributions to this project by purchasing tickets representing hospital equipment sold by Lorraine Johnson. The guest prize, an antique teakwood bowl given by Thelma Henry, was won by Ruth Hattan.

Doris Peyton, presiding in the absence of Thelma Henry, introduced Lillian Hills, who conducted the initiation of Margaret Keeler, Lois Stewart, Rhoda Harden and Ethel Matthews. Corages of blue and gold were presented to each new member by Louise Reinhardt.
