NEW POSTAL REGULATIONS ON DELIVERY OF CHECKS

Postal regulations, pertaining to delivery of checks for a number of benefits administered by the VA have been modified for the greater convenience of veterans and beneficiaries.

The new regulations allow checks to be placed in city and county post office boxes and in mail receptacles on the routes of city and rural mail carriers.

In general, checks affected by the ruling are for compensation and pensions of disabled veterans and beneficiaries of deceased veterans, and for subsistence allowances of veterans in training.

MANY VETERANS STUDYING IN SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES

World War II veterans in training in educational institutions under the servicemen's readjustment act (P. L. 346) reached an all time high in December, with 69,681 enrolled in schools and colleges of the Pacific Northwest, the veterans administration has announced.

This represents an increase of approximately 16 per cent over December, 1946, when 52,404 ex-OIs were taking institutional training. Veterans in on-the-job training

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showed a decrease of nearly one-third during the year. From a high of 16,980 in December, 1946, a steady withdrawal left 11,326 in training at the end of 1947.

Disabled veterans in training under the vocational rehabilitation act (P. L. 16) showed a 25 per cent increase during the year. There were 8059 disabled veterans in both institutional and on-the-job training in December, compared with 6444 the previous year.

Nearly all veterans are entitled to education and training benefits. Information on eligibility and entitlement may be obtained from any VA office.

A. With prior approval of the VA, you may use any remaining entitlement either for job-training or for educational training.

Growers Hail Purchase Plan

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 2 (AP)—Northwest fruit growers today hailed government announcement of a new

purchase program for surplus apples and pears.

The department of agriculture said it would buy \$2,400,000 worth of apples for school lunches—worth approximately 800,000 boxes. Also, shippers will get "diversion payments" of 45 cents a box on winter pears shipped to new markets.

The markets are in North Dakota, South Dakota, Minnesota, Nebraska, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Texas, Louisiana, Tennessee, Mississippi, Alabama, Florida, Georgia and the Carolinas.

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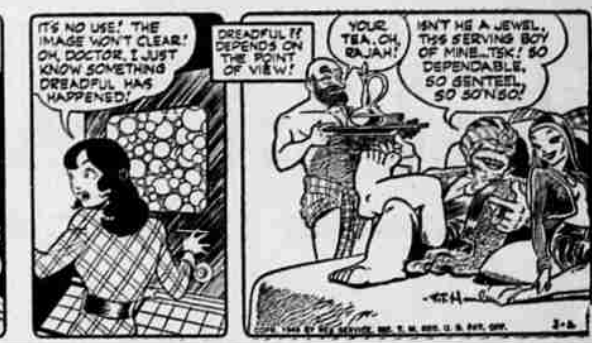
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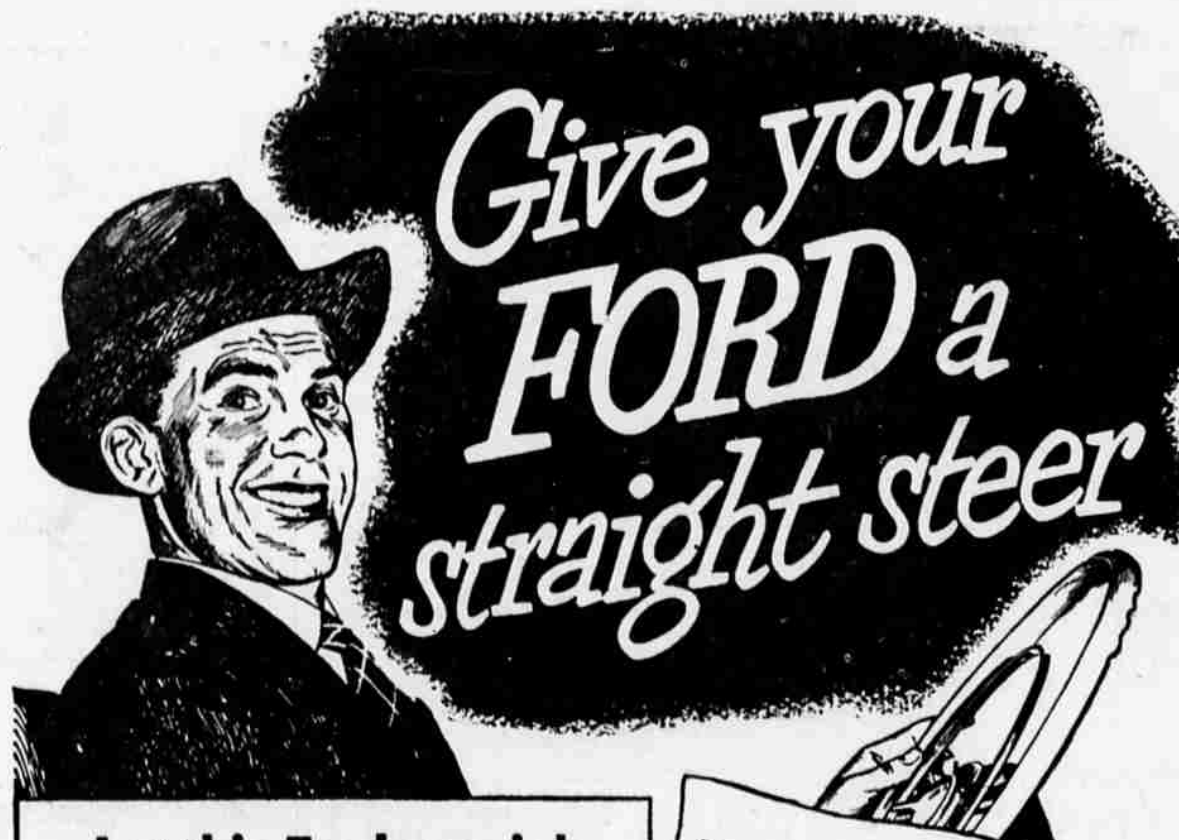
