Girl Sentenced For Church Thefts

CHICAGO, Feb. 2 (AP)—Pearl Stewart, 19, who admitted she went to church to steal purses—always at the most solemn parts of the service—was sentenced to jail for six months and placed in probation for two years in felony court yesterday.

Judge Charles S. Dougherty told the girl that "although the law is designed to give first offenders another chance, yours is a cold-blooded enterprise."

"You maliciously chose the most solemn moments of the mass to steal; moments when the minds of the worshippers are far from worldly things. This was not only a crime, it was sacrilege."

Miss Stewart, who had pleaded guilty to a petty larceny charge, said she had quit her job because of a back injury.
