City Worker Retirement Gets Last OK

A final resolution adopting the public employees retirement system for city employees was passed by the city council Monday night and the plan will go into effect July 1, the new fiscal year.

The resolution was accepted without a vote by city employees, and councilmen explained that no vote is necessary under state law. Mrs. Rose M. Poole, chairman of a citizens' committee on retirement, was present for the third straight week in the interests of the retirement act.

Councilman Wendell A. Smith asked that councilmen be supplied with a monthly breakdown of where arrests are made by city police to see where police manpower is being used.

A year ago, Councilman Condrey said, he asked the mayor to appoint a committee to see what the city could do about establishing a downtown restroom. The committee had never been appointed, he added, and requested that something be done soon.

Police Chief Orville Hamilton was authorized to attend an FBI police chiefs' meeting in Portland, February 24-26.

City Attorney Henry Perkins and the sanitary inspector were named to do something about water in the street and on property along Klamath and 12th streets which councilmen said was creating a sump in the area. They said water is coming from the Klamath Falls Creamery from washing of milk cans and trucks at the Klamath avenue entrance.

Property owners will be contacted to see what can be done about paying the alley from Klamath and Main between 11th and 12th street.

Canadian Gas Eye For Northwest Use

SEATTLE, Feb. 3 (AP) — A first step, an application to the federal power commission, has been taken in a plan to tap Alberta, Canada, gas fields for use by Pacific Northwest cities.

The Northwest Natural Gas company, of Delaware, has filed an application with the commission for a certificate of convenience and necessity. L. E. Karrer, chairman of the chamber of commerce industrial committee, said today. It involves a \$78,000,000 pipeline.

The same approval would be needed from the Canadian government. An international agreement between the two countries would have to be worked out. Then would come the problem of availability of steel and other materials, Karrer said.

TULELAKE, Feb. 3 — A delegation headed by Francis Chambers and Mrs. Don Webster appeared at the bi-monthly meeting of the city council Monday night seeking support of the city in maintaining a summer recreation program similar to that used last year.

City fathers agreed to supply \$500 toward the project, \$220 of which is to be paid now, the remainder to be requested in the budget presented at the beginning of the fiscal year, next July. The \$220 to be taken from the city fund.

Success of the 1947 program was apparent with 200 children being taught to swim, dance, make art and craft work and play at outdoor games. The children were picked up in Tulelake, Merrill and Malin and brought to Klamath Falls to use facilities there, and returned to their homes as part of the program.
