

93 Women Sign Up For OVS Classes

Klamath women have shown an immediate response to homemaking classes at Oregon Vocational School, John Dunn, supervisor of instruction at OVS, said that 93 women have signed their interest in the classes since the announcement was made Saturday that registration was open.

Greatest interest has been shown in general clothing, upholstery and home lighting. Some classes, including tailoring and home decoration, have not yet had sufficient interest shown to make them permanent classes. If more women call the school favoring the classes, they will be put on a permanent basis.

All previously announced classes will hold organization meetings. Those which have sufficient interest will continue, and others will be postponed until more students are enrolled.

Tailoring, Tuesday, February 10, 1 to 4 p. m.

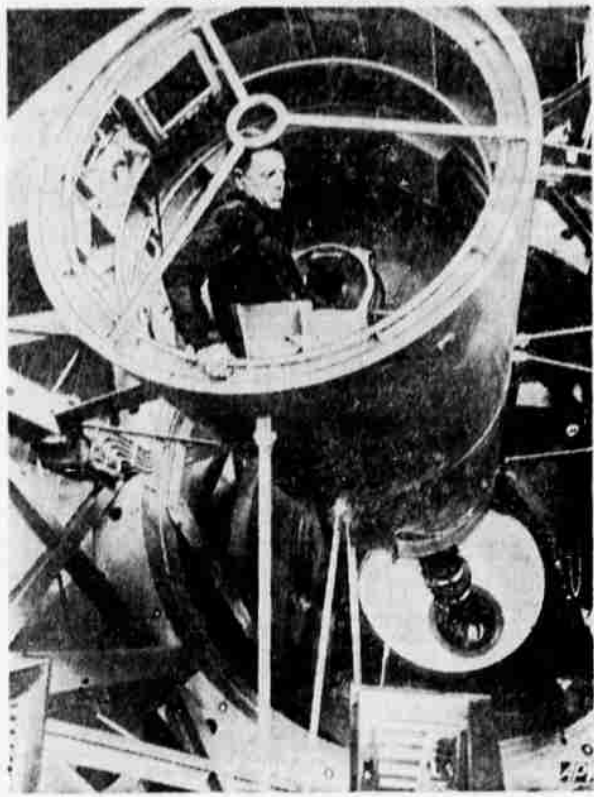
Upholstery, Wednesday, tonight, 7 to 10 p. m.

The child has been in the care of Esther Hendrix of Eugene for some time and the Lane county Red Cross chapter has arranged transportation through its national headquarters. The father reported today that he had secured the services of a Japanese maid to care for the child while he is on duty.
