KLAMATH FALLS AND VICINITY: Occasional snow tonight and Thursday, decreasing late Thursday; high today 28, low tonight 18; high Thursday 28.

NORTHERN CALIFORNIA: Showers in north this morning, spreading over entire area late today and continuing tonight and Thursday; snow in northern counties; continued cold, moderate to heavy snow in the north.

Britons Would Get Into Fray

LONDON, Feb. 4 (AP)—Thousands of Britons have volunteered to fight with rival Jewish and Arab armies in Palestine, Jewish and Arab spokesmen said tonight.

Both said, however, there is no active recruiting in London.

A spokesman for the Arab office said there had been "5000 or 6000 British volunteers" for the Arab armies and admitted applications had been forwarded to Arab league headquarters in Cairo.

A Jewish agency spokesman said the agency had received "many hundreds of applications" but, because of the British foreign enlistments act, it had to say "Thank you very much" and let it go at that.

Take The House And Quit Yapping, Says Landlord

NEW YORK, Feb. 4 (AP)—A Brooklyn landlord, harassed by complaints of a leaky roof, refrigeration, broken windows and inadequate heat, offered yesterday to give the dwelling to his tenants.

Sam Yachter, 35, the landlord, had been brought to court by tenants who complained they had no heat.

Yachter's lawyer explained Yachter was disgusted and would be "ticked to death" to deed the house over "free and clear" to his tenants.

The tenants went into a huddle, then came back with their answer: "Nothing doing."

Morse Asks Camp White Inspection

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4 (AP)—Congressional inspection of two surplus hospitals in Oregon and Iowa has been suggested by Chairman Morse (R-Ore.) of a senate labor subcommittee.

The proposal by Morse came after several veterans administration officials indicated the VA does not want to operate the facilities of Camp White hospital, near Medford, Ore., and Schick general hospital, Clinton, Ia.

"I think members of this committee should make a personal inspection of both Schick and Camp White," Morse said. "The government now has a twenty million dollar investment in them."

Testimony favoring use of the Oregon hospital came from Senator Cordon (R-Ore.), Reps. Ellsworth (R-Ore.), Angell (R-Ore.), and Norblad (R-Ore.) and O. H. Bengtson, a member of the Oregon legislature.

Morse said he would ask the war assets administration to continue a "freeze order" on both hospitals until congress decides the issue. The existing order directs the agency to avoid disposal of the facilities until March 15.

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School Youngsters All Out For Junior Red Cross Work

Klamath's 27 county and city schools boasted a 100 per cent enrollment in the Junior Red Cross it was announced today by Mrs. Frances Palmer, executive secretary of the Klamath county chapter.

The money — in pennies, nickels and dimes — totaled \$337.46, and all schools met their required enrollment fee. Mrs. Palmer said. The money will be used to help schools in former war areas and some gift boxes will also go from here to school children in Belgium, Denmark, Finland, Norway and Luxembourg. Educational films for the schools here will also be purchased from the fund.

Altamont Junior high school students are busy filling 30 gift boxes and Fairview children are filling 20. Every school in the county is working on correspondence booklets which will be exchanged with foreign school children of the same grade level.

Mrs. Palmer said that boxes from Altamont, for girls overseas, will include three school pads, an eraser, pencil sharpener, three pencils, colored pencil, protractor, two cakes of soap, a comb, tooth brush and paste, bobbie pins, two barrettes, washcloth, four spools of thread, two thimbles and a package of needles. Boxes for the boys will vary and instead of sewing articles and some of the toiletries, more masculine gifts will be substituted. The Red Cross will start shipping the boxes within another week.

Also from the fund collected this past month will come expenses for two or three delegates to attend the Junior Red Cross conference at the big national conference in San Francisco June 21 to 24. The delegates will be housed at San Francisco college. Those to attend the conference will be chosen by the Junior Red Cross council.
