Julius Huehn Will Appear In Concert

Klamath music lovers will gather at the Pelican theatre tonight, Wednesday, at 8 o'clock, to hear Julius Huehn, baritone, in a two-hour program. His accompanist is Galen Lurwick, pianist.

Huehn is brought here by the Klamath Concert association. There will be no reserved seats for the concert, and admission will be by membership cards only. Huehn has had extensive experience in operatic and concert work, and has appeared with many of the major symphony orchestras in the country, including the New York Philharmonic, the symphony orchestras of Philadelphia, Boston, Cleveland, Chicago, Chattanooga, Rochester and Grand Rapids.

The young baritone studied under a fellowship at the Juilliard School of Music in New York. His singing career was interrupted in the war when he served as a captain in the marine corps.

Following the meeting the Cubs had a bonfire out of doors and had a wiener roast and marshmallow toast to pass their campfire achievement.

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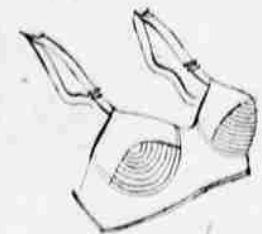
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
