Crash Kills Bandon Man

REEDSPORT, Feb. 5 (AP)—The driver of an automobile that plunged into a deep pool of the Umpqua river east of here had been identified today as Archibald Thurber, 58, Bandon.

Thurber was the second victim of

three mishaps since Saturday in which cars drove off highway 38 and submerged in the river.

Coast guardsmen and police recovered Thurber's body last night, after grappling for the car since Tuesday night when the car lights were seen swinging abruptly from the road. Identity of the victim was not determined until the car was raised from a 60 foot deep pool.

In the earlier mishaps, K. J. McGuire, Reedspport, drowned Satur-

day. Five persons escaped Sunday from a car which went into the river half a mile from the point where Thurber's car left the road.
