

East Oregon Conference Of Episcopalians Closes Here

The 28th Convocation of the Missionary district of Eastern Oregon, of the Protestant Episcopal church, ended with a luncheon served to all the delegates by the Guild of St. Paul's church on Wednesday. The program which was a rather full one was highlighted by a banquet at the Willard hotel on Tuesday night when the speaker was Phil Hitchcock, whose theme was "The Relationship of the World and the Church." Hitchcock stressed the complexities of modern life's conditions, and the necessity of the adoption of these toward a more comprehensive, constructive and moral interpretation in the generic life of man.

On the program were also Mrs. Patricia Hunt, Catherine Blanas and Wilbur Elliott, whose solos and duets were enthusiastically received and contributed much to the enjoyment of the guests. Bishop Barton spoke to the dinner crowd and the Rev. Dixon, of Prineville, stressed briefly the importance of funds for the relief and reconstruction of mission enterprises, devastated by the war, of the church abroad. The rector of St. Paul's church, Rev. F. C. Wissenbach, acted as toastmaster for the evening. A dance climaxed the evening and a happy fellowship among young and old, townspeople and guests from all over Eastern Oregon, was enjoyed.

Notwithstanding the great distances and the threats of winter weather the attendance at all meetings was surprisingly large and practically all clergy were present, and all parishes and missions of the church were represented. The business that was transacted was done in a spirit of forward looking policies and the stress throughout all the talks, the Bishop's charge and the entire tone of conversations and resolutions was one of great effort toward a new evangelization and a deeper realization of the need for the church in the life of the world. The House of Laymen, the Churchwomen's Service league, all pledged themselves for a more rigorous prosecution of such a program of the church.

A service of the Holy Communion, at 7:30 a. m. on Tuesday, was held, at which the Rt. Rev. Lane W. Barton, the bishop, was the celebrant, the rector of St. Paul's acted as epistoler, and the Rev. Lloyd Thomas, vicar of St. Mark's church, Hood River, was the gospelist. The meeting of the laymen was presided over by J. Bellinger of Pendleton, and the meetings of the ladies were in charge of the president of the CWSL, Mrs. O. G. Crawford, of Heppner. Special features of the hospital committee were the luncheon served, as on Tuesday by the auxiliary of St. Paul's church, and an "at home" at the rectory on Monday night, at which nearly a hundred persons came together. Mrs. James Wallinger and her sister, Mrs. A. Culver, Mrs. James Patterson and Mrs. Heber Radcliffe presided at the tea tables.

All in all the convocation was a happy occasion and guests and hosts all enjoyed it immensely.

Missionary Will Speak
