Phil Hitchcock Is DAR Guest Speaker

Daughters of the American Revolution, Eulonia chapter, met Monday evening at the home of Mrs. Charles J. Martin, 228 N. 7th. Mrs. H. A. Nitschelm and Mrs. Harry Goeller Sr. were co-hostesses.

Mrs. Hugh T. Mitchelmore, chapter regent, introduced the speaker of the evening, Phil Hitchcock, whose subject was "Communism." Mr. Hitchcock pointed out the dangers of letting the will for peace blind Americans to the dangers of enemies within and without. He spoke of the infiltration of communists into government agencies, labor unions, clubs, schools and churches.

The two systems of government, Russia and the United States of America, will clash or be modified, the most viable will survive, is the speaker's prophecy. Communism is the religion of Russia, according to Mr. Hitchcock, and its philosophy is based on the subjection of the people to the rulers. He pointed out that the philosophy of the government of this country is based on the teachings of the Christian religion and the principles of the Sermon on the Mount. Such teachings emphasize the importance of the individual man and the duty of the government to serve him. He concluded by saying, "The way to save our way of life is to live it, and to feel the urgency that our revolutionary fathers felt at our nation's birth when they felt sure they must all hang together or run the risk of hanging separately."

During the business session of the chapter, a contribution of \$19 was made to a fund being raised to charter a bus to take the Gold Key art
