

'Vets' Farm School At Tule Talked

TULELAKE, Feb. 9—Preparatory to opening of the new agricultural school for veterans here, officials of the veterans' administration of agricultural education in the state and of the Siskiyou Joint Union high school will meet Tuesday, February 10 at 11 a. m. in the building just completed on the high school grounds.

Administrative plans for the school which will be open only to veterans will be discussed.

The building, constructed from school buildings from the Jap camp at an approximate cost of \$38,000, contains six classrooms, administrative offices and a 60 by 40 shop.

Students will get eight hours of actual classroom study per month and an undetermined period of farm work.

Scheduled for the conference talks are J. Everett Walker, regional supervisor of agricultural education; E. W. Everett, supervisor of veteran training, both of Redding; L. E. Keneffick, training officer of the veterans' administration; a Mr. Baumgarten, regional officer of the Veterans administration, San Francisco, and J. E. Hurley, Yreka, superintendent of Siskiyou county schools.

Representing the Tulelake community at the conference will be Mrs. Katherine Addison, secretary of the chamber of commerce; Olney Ridd, American Legion; Ralph Sawyer, new homesteader; Clifford Wood, manager of the Tulelake Growers; Paul Rodgers, new homesteader; Eldon Larson, Fayil West, and Earl Sykes, news editor of the Tulelake Reporter.

Krug Plan To Benefit Westerners

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9 (AP)—Seventeen western states will benefit heavily if congress adopts Secretary of the Interior Krug's plan for administration of tidewater oil lands.

Krug has submitted the draft of a bill which would divide proceeds from the leasing of government-owned coastal oil and gas fields as follows:

- 37 1/2 per cent directly to the states off which the oil and gas are recovered. Currently, this would include California, Texas and Louisiana, where tidal drilling is under way.
- 52 1/2 per cent to the federal reclamation fund. This is administered by congress for the benefit of the 17 states—where land is made useful by irrigation.
- 10 per cent into the federal treasury.

The only coastal states in the reclamation zone are California, Oregon, Washington and Texas. The other tidal-oil states, along the Atlantic coast and in the Gulf of Mexico, would not share in the reclamation split. Neither would Alaska.

"It would take an amendment of the reclamation act to make them eligible," Harry Edelstein, interior department attorney, told a reporter.

The supreme court upheld the federal government's claim to the tidal oil lands last June. The court ruled that the government's interest in underwater resources extends from the ebb-tide line to the three-mile limit.
