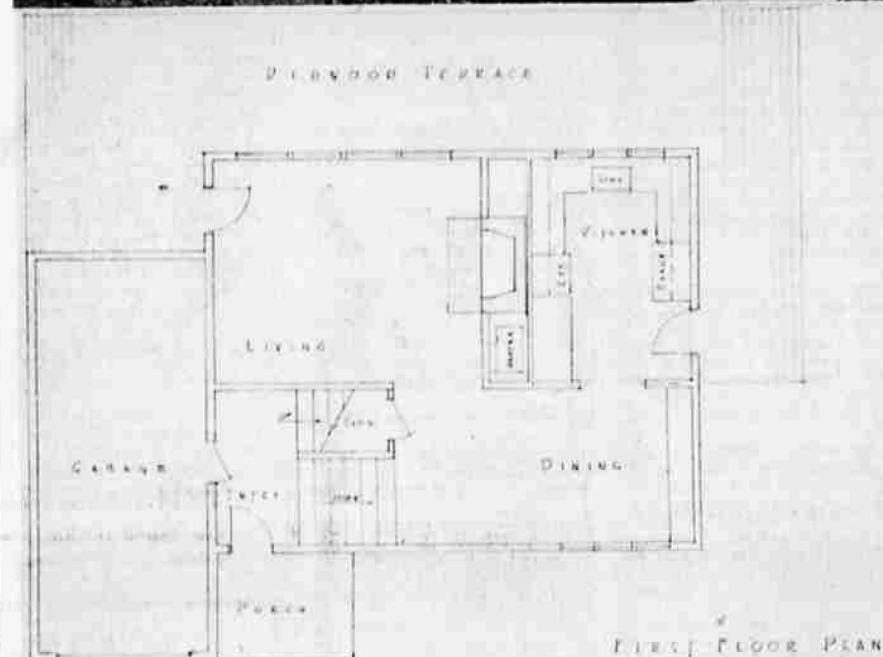

New Design, Color Scheme Features Of New Home

"Unusual" is the word for this modern home whose large back window measures 13 feet wide and 16 tall and commands a view of the city. Heat from the sun also filters through the clear glass of this window eliminating the need of furnace heat during the day.

No basement, no utility room and no furnace room are included in this building because they are not needed due to everything being "built-in."

A light cheery color scheme is used in the house and the walls are finished with lacquered fir flooring. This five-room home of Jim Burness Jr. has a fireplace at one end of the long, high living room. Upstairs bedrooms are papered and so is the kitchen ceiling.

The easy-to-take-care-of house is finished on the outside with re-sawn fir siding protected by a clear bleaching oil in place of paint or stain. It has a 24-foot deep single garage and is roofed with asbestos cap sheet.

A wide redwood veranda or "outdoor living-room" extends from the back, and the yard below will be terraced and planted to lawn and flowers.

Sheldon Brumbaugh was the architect, Verne Swanson worked out the color scheme and O. B. Larson was the building contractor.

Camp White Protest Made

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10 (AP)—Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore.) said today veterans administration opposition to use of Camp White in Oregon as a veterans' hospital "illustrates adequately how arbitrary bureaus of the government can sometimes become."

Ellsworth and Senators Morse and Gordon, Oregon republicans, have introduced bills to convert the former army camp into a veterans' domiciliary facility.

The representative said he was amazed at the veterans administration estimate of \$1,500,000 as the cost of conversion.

He said in a statement he insisted on a breakdown of this estimate and found the agency was able to account for only \$1,285,000.

This, he said, covered the estimated cost of a combination 500-bed domiciliary facility and a 500-bed general hospital, although the bills pending called only for domiciliary use.

"On studying the figures I became convinced that the estimate had been padded by three hundred per cent by inclusion of items and facilities not included in the bill," Ellsworth said.

Fleeing Chinese Jam Airlines

SHANGHAI, Feb. 10 (AP)—A mass flight of thousands from danger spots in China's civil war is straining all available airlines. The only escape from most communist threatened cities is by air—for officer and civilian alike.

Americans returning from Mukden, Southern Manchuria, say the situation is critical. Government workers, high military officers and moneyed civilians are battling each other to get air transportation to safety.

Local Boys Buy Gilts

Three Klamath county 4-H club boys are now the proud owners of registered gilts that were purchased Saturday at the third annual Oregon Swine Growers' bred gilt sale in Salem, Francis A. Skinner, club agent, said today.

The boys, James Barrett, Jimmy Swift and Edgar Hoffman of Henley, made the trip to purchase the hogs to promote their 4-H breeding project. Swift and Hoffman purchased Hampshires from Charles A. Evans, a Salem breeder, and Barrett bought a Duroc from C. E. Stretcher, a Beaverton breeder.

Considerable notice was given the boys as they had traveled such a distance to attend the sale. While they were not the only 4-H bidders at the auction, they were the largest group and several of the breeders talked with them about their projects. The gilts will farrow in March and one of the litters may be used for the fat hog class.

Death Sentence Asked For Tojo

TOKYO, Feb. 10 (AP)—The prosecution indicated today it would ask the death penalty for Hideki Tojo and 24 other Japanese war leaders.

"In effect, I am asking for the death penalty," said Chief Prosecutor Joseph B. Keenan. He will begin his summation of the allied case tomorrow (about 7:30 p. m., today, EST).

"That is, I am asking in effect for a liberal employment of manila rope."

The international tribunal today dismissed a defense motion for acquittal. The trial began June 3, 1946.
