Eastern Oregon—Fair and not so cold today and tonight. High this afternoon 36 to 40. Low tonight 19 to 20. Friday increasingly cloudy and warmer, with high around 35 to 45.

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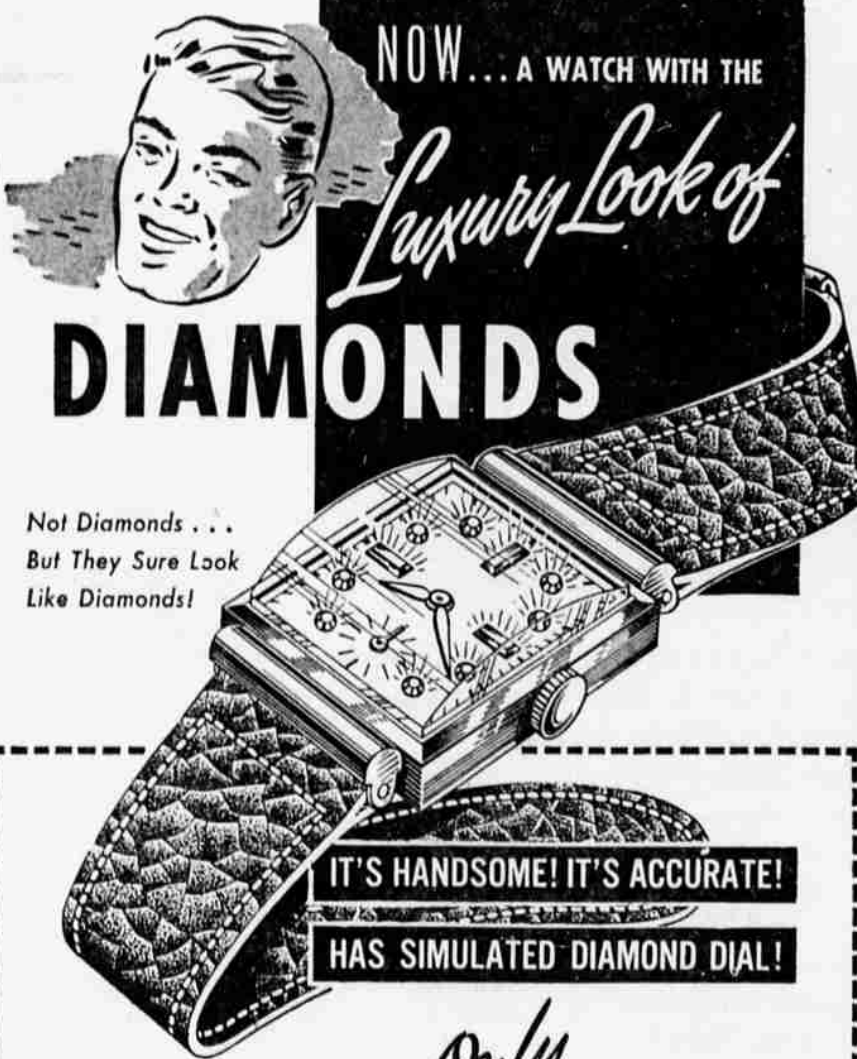
