Printers To Meet Here

The Master Printers of Oregon, organized in Portland in December, will hold a board meeting in Klamath Falls on March 21. Otto L. Smith, vice president of the state organization has just announced. Local as well as statewide problems of commercial printing establishments will be discussed at the meeting here.

All Klamath Falls shops are included in the Master Printers of Oregon, which is affiliated with the national organization of commercial printers, known as the Printing Industry of America. The Klamath shops meet locally to discuss local problems and needs, along with the Chiloquin Review, which is a member of the state organization. Dorris and Tulelake are to be invited to join the Klamath organization, thus including the entire basin.

When Master Printers of Oregon was organized, it chose J. E. Turnbull of Eugene, as its president, Otto L. Smith of Klamath Falls, vice president, and Orrin M. Downey of Portland, secretary. The board of directors includes one member from each congressional district of Oregon. Otto Smith serving as the member from the Second district.

Cold Weather Cuts Power

BEND, Feb. 13 (AP)—Three Central Oregon counties were short of power again today. The cold weather was blamed. Low temperatures increased demand for electricity at the same time that lowered stream flow in the frozen Deschutes river and ice hogged fuel at power plants cut the supply.

Fish Problems Considered

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (AP)—President Truman says the state Department has under active consideration the naming of a high level official to handle international fisheries problems. Senator Magnuson (D-Wash.) told a reporter today that the president had written him to that effect. Magnuson, Rep. Tolleson (R-Wash.) and West coast fisheries industry officials have urged such action. They say it is needed to give the nation's fisheries a better standing in negotiating on international fishery problems.

Scouts To Aid In Air Sign Plan

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (AP)—Boy Scouts are going to paint 1000 air markers on rooftops to help guide private fliers across the country. The project was announced today by the civil aeronautics administration, which will supervise the work of the 1,500,000 Scouts. The markers will show the direction and distance to the nearest airport; fix the location of the marker in terms of longitude and latitude, and give the name of the community in which the marker is located.

Civic, aircraft owners and pilots' groups are cooperating, CAA said. Scouts in Louisiana, Oklahoma, Missouri and Arizona already have started their work.

Stock Leak Story Boomed

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (AP)—A veteran New Orleans cotton dealer told senators Thursday there isn't any basis for talk of "inside" government information "leaking" to commodity speculators. Lulled back in the senate agriculture committee's witness chair, E. F. Creekmore said there may have been leaks at one time, but not in recent years.

"I have never yet heard of any leaks coming out of the department of agriculture. There has been no chance for inside information legislatively (from congress) because congress has not been considering farm commodities." The agriculture committee is one of three congressional groups currently inquiring into speculation in cotton, grain and other commodities. The others are a senate appropriations committee and a special house committee.

Saltonstall Asks Harmony

PORTLAND, Feb. 13 (AP)—Oregon republicans were asked by Senator Saltonstall (R-Mass.) here Wednesday night to avoid bitter personal campaigning in the party's job of selecting a presidential nominee. He said new men and new ideas and methods were needed in the federal government and that the party had available several "fin men" to head the party ticket in November.

Saltonstall spoke at a Lincoln Day banquet sponsored by Oregon republicans. The three-times governor of Massachusetts said lower taxes and less waste in government must be the party's goal. He added that the party must recognize the "rightful concern" of the federal government in public health, education and civil rights.

"The key to this insurance for decent living lies in a solvent government," he said.

Snowbound Town Opened Up

ASTORIA, Feb. 13 (AP)—The 40 families who were snow-bound in the Camp McGregor logging community had a way out to civilization again today. A highway department snow plow cleared the mountain road, enabling a pneumonia-stricken man to reach a hospital and other residents to buy supplies.

The snow lay up to 14 inches deep on the nine-mile road. The logging railroad, too, was snowbound. Camp McGregor is located in Southeastern Clatsop county.

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Divers To Raise Barge

ST. HELENS, Ore., Feb. 13 (AP)—A diver and derrick are about to salvage a petroleum barge and its 5000 barrels of oil from the bottom of the Columbia river. The 120-foot barge sank 50 feet as the result of two separate collisions and the flood of last month. Not until two weeks ago did the flood subside enough to start salvage work. Two derricks have lifted the front of the barge out of the water. Salvage operators hope to pump out enough of air water to float the barge.
