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FDR Started To Write Biography
NEW YORK, Feb. 13 (AP)—An examination of the papers of the late President Roosevelt has disclosed that he was working on a biography of John Paul Jones during his last year in the White House.

His son, Elliott, said yesterday that "no one knew he had been working on it, not even mother," until Mrs. Roosevelt found a 10,000-word synopsis of the naval hero's life among the president's papers.

"Father's facts are different from any life story that has ever appeared on Jones," Roosevelt said. He added that "now, I'm amplifying all this rare data into a historical novel."

Music Contest Here Saturday

The Southern Oregon district contest for solos and small ensembles will be held in Klamath Falls at the high school on Saturday, March 13. It is expected that several hundred high school students from points in Southern Oregon will be here on that day competing for ratings. Judges for the Klamath Falls' contest are John Stehn, director of band and professor at the University of Oregon, Karl Ernst, supervisor of music, Portland, Daniel Backman, director of band and orchestra, Vancouver high school, Vancouver, Wash., and Joseph Brye, professor of piano at Oregon State college.
