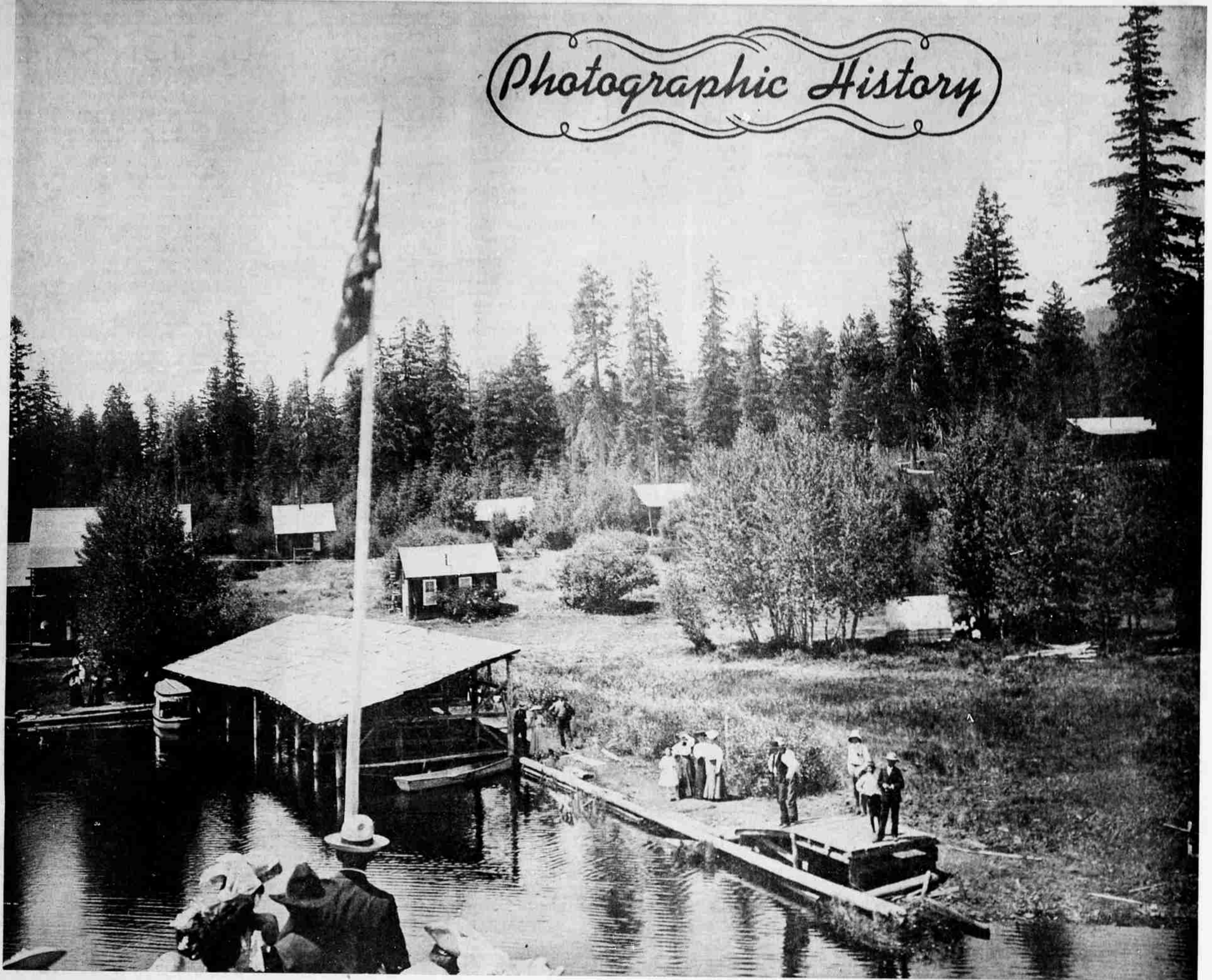


Photographic History



Harriman Lodge On Upper Klamath Lake— Bringing back many a nostalgic memory to old timers here who enjoyed Harriman lodge in its hey-day along about '13, '14 and '15. This old picture from the Maude Baldwin collection, was taken from the cabin of one of the boats which operated on the upper lake, probably around 1909. At the extreme left, partially hidden by a tree, stands the old log lodge which was built before the turn of the century and before E. H. Harriman of New York financial fame, became interested in this area. The guest houses sprung up as more interest was manifested in the beautiful, natural country, by San Franciscans and folks from the East coast.

Harriman became interested in the property around 1907 and on acquiring the land, the development became known as Harriman lodge and so remains to this day. The Southern Pacific bought the property at a later date and it was sold to the Klamath Development soon after the death of Mr.

Harriman. When the Fleischhacker company of San Francisco became financially interested in the KD company several new cottages were added and the grounds took on a more pretentious atmosphere. Herbert Fleischhacker and his family spent a part of the summer of 1915 at the lodge and there were many interesting visitors. It took all day to go by team from Klamath Falls to Harriman lodge but most of the guests chose the two or three-hour trip by launch from Klamath Falls. Harriman lodge burned two years ago, but many of the smaller buildings still stand, and the present owner, Gus Johnson, (no relation to Paul and S. O. Johnson who headed the KD company), now has ambitious plans for the rebuilding of Harriman lodge. Folks still talk about the week-end party of the entire Bohemian club of San Francisco back in 1913, guests of Paul and S. O. Johnson. Note the visitors standing on the launch as it approaches the dock and bathhouse.

FOREST GROVE, Ore., Feb. 14 (AP)—Four students from Pacific college of Newberg, Ore., still are champions of the annual barber shop ballad contest here.

Missing Plane Search Shifts

PORTLAND, Feb. 14 (AP)—The search for the missing pilot, Billy Guy Holliday, 22, centered today on Oregon's Columbia Gorge hills be-

tween Crown Point and the Bridge of the Gods.

A farmer reported seeing smoke arise from the area near Larch mountain after search planes passed over the area the other day.

A railroad work crew also said they had seen a plane answering the description of Holliday's last Saturday. It narrowly missed the Bridge of the Gods, then turned toward the Oregon hills and disappeared in a snow flurry, workmen said.

Holliday has been missing since Saturday on a flight from his job at Richland, Wash., to his home at Oregon City.

VA Clamps Down On Flying School

ASTORIA, Feb. 14 (AP)—The veterans administration and the Inman Brothers Aviation service were involved today in a controversy that had the flying service closed.

Charles Langdon, VA official, said those studying flight training under the GI bill of rights had been ordered suspended at the Inman service "pending determination of irregularities in reporting of the flying time of GI students."

John Inman, co-owner of the aviation service, said the problem came down to a "pure technicality." He said he and his brother would continue to offer flight training at Seaside and Hillsboro.

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
