

MARKETS and FINANCIAL WHEAT SHOWS GAINS TODAY

CHICAGO, Feb. 16 (AP)—Weather and reduced country offerings came to the rescue of grain on the board of trade today. Corn led a sharp uptick, spurring as much as 8 cents at times. Soybeans and lard were stronger.

Melting snows in the Southwest raised apprehension that any cold wave might damage unprotected wheat. Commercial interests bought wheat, reflecting reports of a better domestic flour business. Traders said there was no indication the government had purchased cash wheat.

Offerings of corn on a to-arrive basis by the country totaled only 85,000 bushels, a small amount for a Monday. Oats were strong in sympathy with the yellow grain advance.

Wheat closed 3 1/2-5 1/2 higher, May \$2.40 1/4-1/2, corn was 5 to 8 cents higher, May \$2.04, oats were 1 to 4 1/2 higher, May \$1.07 1/4-1/2, and soybeans were 8 cents higher, March \$3.33.

Stocks Show Gains Today

NEW YORK, Feb. 16 (AP)—Stocks revived today, after a lengthy string of "Blue Mondays," with market leaders pushing up fractions to 2 points.

The principal flaw in the bullish picture was lack of volume. Mild professional short covering and other bidding followed a rally in commodities and resulted in good gains for rails and industrials after a hesitant opening. While extreme advances were shaded here and there near the close, many pivots held around the day's best. Transfers ran to about 800,000 shares, smallest for a full session in a week.

Ahead were Santa Fe, Rock Island, Great Northern Railway, Chrysler, General Motors, U. S. Steel, American Telephone and Texas Co.

Credit for the resumption of buying was given mainly to the idea that the list had been oversold in sympathy with slumping staples and was entitled to a technical comeback, even if only temporary.

Bonds were narrow. Cotton, toward the finish, was up 70 cents to \$2.60 a bale. At Chicago wheat ended up 3 1/2 to 5 1/2 cents a bushel, corn 5 to the permissible limit of 8, and oats 1 to 4 1/2.

J. N. Bramhall Dies At 75

J. N. Bramhall, former resident and businessman of Klamath Falls, died Saturday morning at Paradise, Calif. and is to be buried Wednesday at Gresham, Ore. He was 75.

Mr. Bramhall was born in Manhattan, Kan. in 1872. He came to Oregon as a young man and was in the sawmill business near Portland. He was a state representative from Clackamas county in 1904.

He came to Klamath county in 1916 and was superintendent for Lamm Lumber company when that mill was located on the east side of Upper Klamath lake. Later Mr. Bramhall was in the feed and grain business here. He moved to California in 1933.

and three years as a law enforcement agent for the Oregon state department of agriculture. When war broke out he went into the army, was with the 30th field artillery, and was discharged as a captain.

Tulelake Political Pot Quiet

TULELAKE, Feb. 16—No indication of interest in the three council seats or the office of city treasurer had been shown yet Monday, although registrations were in order last Friday. Date of the city election is April 13 and the time for filing ends March 4.

Two of the council members, W. R. Moore and Clarence Schott, whose terms expire stated that they did not plan to run for re-election. Ralph B. Fausett, mayor, was not immediately available for a statement.

The treasurer's post has been filled since the resignation of Halie Routh some months ago by Mrs. Sara Welsh, former managing editor of the Tulelake Reporter. Routh resigned to leave for Madras, Ore., to make his home and Mrs. Welsh was appointed to fill out the unexpired term until the next municipal election. There are still two years of the four year stretch to run. Mrs. Welsh, who is recovering from an extended illness does not plan to file.

Two councilmen will be elected for four year terms and one for two years. Holdover city dads are William Seigler, tavern operator and Al Porter, grocer.

Unofficial political mention for a council chair has been made of Charles Card, former mayor of Merrill, Ore., operator of a cafe here and city long active in the promotion banner co-opener of the Tulelake Electric, a comparative newcomer to this region but interested in city development and the new flying strip under construction near Newell, is also in the limelight. No prospective candidate for the treasurer's seat has as yet shown up.

Mrs. Victoria Thaler, city clerk, still has two more years of her term to complete.
