**NORTHERN CALIFORNIA**—Cloudy to extreme north with few light showers today, and partly cloudy tonight and Tuesday. Generally fair elsewhere today, tonight and Tuesday with local morning fog along coast. Little change in temperature. Gentle northwesterly fog along coast. Little change in temperature. Gentle northwesterly winds off coast, except moderate southwesterly above Cape Mendocino.

**WESTERN OREGON**—Mostly cloudy with showers today, followed by rain tonight and Tuesday. Little change in temperature. High 45 to 50. Low tonight 40 to 45. Fresh to strong southwesterly winds off coast, becoming southerly late this afternoon and increasing to gale force tonight and Tuesday. Fresh easterly winds in Columbia gorge Tuesday.
