

Second To Pope Passes

VATICAN CITY, Feb. 16 (AP)—Gennaro Cardinal Granito Pignatelli di Belmonte, 96, second only to Pope Pius XII in the hierarchy of the Roman Catholic church, died today of a bladder ailment complicated by old age.

Cardinal Pignatelli, who was a prince of the Italian aristocracy as well as a prince of the church, expired at 10:13 a. m. in his simply furnished apartment in the historic Vatican church of Santa Martha. He had known five popes in his long life and has been an intimate of the present pontiff and his predecessor. He had been dean of the College of Cardinals for nearly 18 years.

Francesco Cardinal Marchetti-Selvagiani, 76, bishop of Frascati, vicar general of Rome and archbishop of the Basilica of St. John Lateran, succeeds Cardinal Pignatelli as cardinal dean. Cardinal Marchetti-Selvagiani, a native of Rome, has been a cardinal since June 30, 1930.

Cardinal Pignatelli, bishop of Albano and Ostia, was in charge of arranging all pontifical ceremonies as prefect of the congregation of ceremonies.

His death reduced the membership of the College of Cardinals to 60. Its full strength is 70.

FARM TRAINING FOR VETS UNDER G. I. BILL

Although farm management training under the G. I. bill ordinarily is limited to one veteran on a single farm, the veterans administration has announced three conditions under which two veterans may take training on the same farm.

To qualify for the farm management instruction, a veteran must own his own farm or have economic control of a farm. Veterans who do not own their own farm may take institutional on-farm training as employee-trainees of a successful farmer approved by the farm training institution.

The conditions which will qualify two veterans for farm management training on the same farm are: (1) The approved training institution and the VA must find that conditions on the farm will assure successful training and subsequent self-employment on the same farm for both veterans.

(2) The training of both veterans must meet all requirements specified in Public Law 377 which established the institutional on-farm training program.

(3) The two veterans must furnish documentary evidence that they have formed a bona fide partnership, with equal authority in the management and operation of the farm.

Almost 87 per cent of the 203,000 World War II veterans enrolled for institutional on-farm training under the G. I. bill are training on farms under their control. The remainder are training as employee-trainees on farms approved by the training institution.

DISABLED VETERANS RECEIVE SPECIAL AUTOMOBILES
The veterans administration has announced that 501 disabled veterans in the Pacific Northwest have been certified as eligible to receive automobiles at government expense.

World War II veterans who lost the use of one or both legs during service may receive cars for which the VA will pay up to \$1600, including special equipment.

Certification by states has been as follows: Washington, 176; Oregon, 174; Idaho, 83; Montana, 66; Alaska, 2.

Oregon Gets \$1,479,960 In Natural Resources Pay

Nearly 8 million dollars—the largest payment of its kind in history—is being distributed to 22 states as their share in last year's proceeds from the sale of natural resources on public lands under the jurisdiction of the bureau of land management in the department of the interior, it was announced by Secretary J. A. Krug.

Oregon's portion is \$1,479,960—the third largest. Wyoming's \$1,954,896 represents the top payment, followed by California with \$1,570,433. New Mexico is the fourth state in the million-dollar class with \$1,090,084.

Thirty-seven and one-half per cent of the rentals, bonuses and royalties received in connection with the removal of coal, oil and gas, potash, phosphate, sodium and sulfur from the public lands is distributed to the states in which the collections are received, and most of the remainder is placed in the reclamation fund. Fifty per cent of gross receipts under the Taylor grazing act of 1934 is earmarked for the respective states, and 50 per cent of receipts under the O&C act of 1937 is deposited in the general funds of 18 land-grant counties in Western Oregon.

Last year Oregon counties received \$1,442,121, mostly from the sale of timber on the O&C lands; the state received \$37,055 from the Taylor grazing act and \$785 from mineral receipts.

On the other hand, 95 per cent of the receipts in Wyoming, California and New Mexico were derived from minerals. Nevada received the largest apportionment under the Taylor grazing act, \$72,810.

Since 1905 receipts from the general land office have always been considerably in excess of expenditures.

Red Plot Seen In Korea Move

SEOUL, Feb. 16 (AP)—A high American official said today a Russian puppet government has been established in North Korea. He declared it has an army, a flag and a constitution—in open defiance of international agreements.

The official charged that establishment of the government was timed to coincide with the United Nations commission's recent announcement of failure of its mission to Korea.

He made his charges at a news conference, but asked that he not be named.

Russian occupation officials are charged with governing North Korea. Americans administer South Korea.

The UN commission was refused entry into the Russian zone to plan nationwide elections preliminary to giving Korea a self government. Chairman K. P. S. Menon is to report the commission's failure to the assembly next week.

The American source said "we have ample information" that an armistice estimated at 200,000 North Koreans is equipped with Russian materials, medium tanks and light planes.

Two Killed In Highway Accident
PENDLETON, Feb. 16 (AP)—Two men were killed when their automobile and a truck sideswiped on U. S. highway 730 four miles west of Umatilla last night.

Patrick J. Carey, 44, Spokane, and Rand Miller, 45, North Richland, Wash., were killed. Uninjured were Andrew Kullish, 31, Killdeer, N. D., the truck driver, and his two companions.

Farmers Complain Of Hunters Shooting Hawks

The shooting of carnivorous hawks is against the federal game laws but many people are apparently unaware of this, Klamath basin farmers state.

Thousands of dollars are lost each year through damage caused by marsh mice feeding upon seeds, tender shoots and buds, farmers explain. These marsh mice are the main diet of rough-leg and red-tail hawks which are common to this part of the Northwest.

Many of the people who use hawks for shooting targets believe they are doing a favor in killing "chicken" hawks. The birds perch along power lines and in pine trees, a great many of them along the road, especially by the marshy area along Upper Klamath lake.

People who shoot them usually do so from the highway which is another violation and often break or crack power insulators which is a third misdemeanor.

Rough-leg and red-tail hawks are government protected birds because of their value to farmers. Farmers themselves state that most of the violators are uninformed and are willing to listen when the facts are explained to them, but it is impossible to deliver a lecture on wildlife to everyone found carrying firearms within private land boundaries.

China May Turn To Barter System
NANKING, Feb. 16 (AP)—The official Daily News said today China may resort to barter to keep its rice bowls filled.

The newspaper said plans are afoot to trade soy beans, bristles, tungoil and tea for rice and other foodstuffs. The government also is seeking grants of food from other nations to supplement already substantial American commitments of wheat and rice.

Butcher Official Asks Fewer Laws

PORTLAND, Feb. 16 (AP)—A spokesman for the APL Butchers union told western states delegates here yesterday that labor should seek fewer labor laws.

David Dolnick, international research director of the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen of North America, said labor also should approach negotiations with employers with less hostility.

Some 100 representatives of butchers union locals in 11 western states attended the two-day conference.
