Texan Gets High Praise

CHICAGO, Feb. 17 (AP)—A young Texan who stabbed a burglar to death with a pen-knife was commended and released from technical custody Monday.

In returning a verdict of justifiable homicide at the inquest into the burglar's death, the coroner's jury signed a message to Arthur "Rex" Casper, 19, who slew the burglar yesterday:

"We the jury commend you for your heroic actions."

Casper, a former marine from Bishop, Tex., and one-time resident of Lewiston, Mont., is enrolled in a Chicago electrical school.

The dead man was identified by police as Edward J. Dicks, 38, of Chicago, who has a petty larceny police record dating back to 1929.

Casper said he saw Dicks in a grocery store through a broken front door. He pulled out his knife, and warned the intruder to stay where he was. Instead, the Texan said, Dicks sallied out and the fatal struggle followed.

Stockmen Veto Price Curbs

RISEBURG, Feb. 17 (AP)—Opposition to price control and meat rationing was one of 18 resolutions approved at the 11th annual meeting of the Western Oregon Livestock association which closed here Saturday.

Charles A. Evans, Independence, and V. J. Philippi, Roseburg, were elected president and vice president, respectively. Harry A. Lindgren, Oregon State college extension service, was re-elected secretary-treasurer. Evans succeeded Albert Jullian, Lyons, as president.

The livestock group declared rationing and price control would reduce rather than increase meat supplies by encouraging black marketing, and bring about uneven distribution.

They asked for a reasonable export policy on grain and a speed-up of reclamation, irrigation, drainage, and flood control projects in the state as their arguments against continuing meat scarcity.

Other resolutions called for the election of a new sales and show ring on the Oregon State fairgrounds including sleeping quarters for FFA and adult fair exhibitors. Next year's meeting will be at Astoria.

Rent Controls Held Legal

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17 (AP)—The supreme court Monday unanimously upheld federal rent controls.

Justice Douglas spoke for the court. He said "the war power sustains this legislation." Douglas added:

"Whatever may be the consequences when war is officially terminated, the war power does not necessarily end with the cessation of hostilities."

The court's ruling reversed a decision by Federal Judge Paul Jones in Cleveland that congress cannot exercise its war power to control rent when "in fact" the nation is at peace.

Jones said congress lost its rent control powers on December 31, 1946, when President Truman declared hostilities at an end. Jones declared unconstitutional the rent control section of the 1947 Housing and Rent act. The act expires February 29.

WASHINGTON, Pa., Feb. 17 (AP)—Julius Paulekas, a coal miner, reflected proudly today that he is the father-in-law of one of the nation's wealthiest young men.

The 60-year-old miner has been the toast of this mining community since he learned his daughter, Eva, married Winthrop Rockefeller Saturday at Palm Beach, Fla.

News of his daughter's wedding, however, hasn't changed Paulekas' outlook one bit.

"I'm a coal miner," he said yesterday, "and will die a coal miner. Too much money is good for Eva but no good for me."

Paulekas said he and Eva's mother, now Mrs. Peter Neveckas, of Lowell, Ind., parted 28 years ago in Chicago. He hasn't seen Eva since 1932 when she visited him in Chicago, Paulekas said.

YOUTH TELLS OF SLAYING

SALEM, Mass., Feb. 17 (AP)—Laurence J. Reddy, 21-year-old bridegroom of four months, calmly pleaded innocent in district court Monday to a murder charge in the slaying of Beatrice Blanchard, 17, a baby-sitter with whom he formerly kept company.

Judge George B. Sears continued the case until March 12 and held Reddy without bail.

Reddy was arrested by waiting policemen as he and his young wife alighted from a taxicab two hours after the battered night-gown-clad body of Beatrice was found Saturday night in the dining room of Mr. and Mrs. Lester Oppenheim.

The Oppenheims had left the girl to care for their two-year-old son while they went to a movie.

Police Lt. William H. O'Neil said Reddy admitted the slaying of his former girl friend in a dictated confession. He said she had not been sexually assaulted.

Several kitchen knives and an electric flatiron were found near the body, police said.

O'Neil said Reddy told him the Blanchard girl laughed at him for having married. He "lost his head and started to struggle with her," O'Neil quoted Reddy as saying.

Troops Asked In Palestine Debate

LAKE SUCCESS, Feb. 17 (AP)—The Palestine partition commission called upon the security council Monday for adequate military force to help divide the Holy Land into Jewish and Arabic countries.

In a strongly worded special report, the commission told the security council that time is of "utmost importance" in carrying out the partition orders of the 1947 UN assembly.

It declared that "powerful Arab interests, both inside and outside Palestine," are defying the general assembly and are deliberately trying to alter by force the partition plan.

Farmers Up For Thefts

PORTLAND, Feb. 17 (AP)—Six Corvallis area farmers have been questioned in connection with thefts from Camp Adair, FBI Agent Howard I. Bobbitt said today.

He said the men admitted taking 45 to 50 barrels of "goop," an inflammable substance useful in burning stumps, and were released after making their statements. Bobbitt said the case had been referred to the United States attorney's office.

Army engineers, charged with guarding Camp Adair, reported that for the past year a number of things have been missing, including electric motors and electrical equipment. The "goop" disappeared in the past

J., Feb. 17 (AP)—Henry Noel, 27-year-old Harvard university graduate who has renounced his American citizenship to live as a laborer in Germany, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Martin Noel of Baltusrol road, Summit, N. A member of the family said Mr. and Mrs. Noel were on a vacation trip to Puerto Rico. All further information was declined.
