

Jap Woman Tried For Atrocities

TOKYO, Feb. 18 (AP)—A woman today was charged with serving American airmen's livers at a Japanese officers mess.

She is Shizuko Totsui, former army nurse and the first Japanese woman slated for trial on war atrocity charges. She and 27 men co-defendants are accused of killing eight B-29 fliers in medical experiments.

Five of the men, who allegedly ate the livers served with liquor, are charged with cannibalism.

Cut Open Heart

U. S. eighth army prosecutors said the stolid woman defendant made all arrangements for horrible experiments on the Americans.

The charges include cutting open the heart of one—while he still lived—and attempting to stitch it up again. The fliers have not been named.

Allied headquarters said the experiments occurred in Kinsu imperial university's medical school at Fukuoka. The prosecution says they began after Tokyo army headquarters ordered local disposition of captive U. S. airmen.

It charged that livers of the fliers were served at a special lunch for army officers and hospital surgeons—and that the diners were fully aware of what they were eating.

The prosecution charged that the skull of one flier was opened by a surgeon interested in tracing epilepsy—although the American was not an epileptic. The flier died to death.

The hospital's chief surgeon, Dr. Fukujiro Ishiyama, hanged himself shortly after he was arrested.

Salesmanship Course Added

Stassen Plans Four-Day Tour Of Oregon Cities

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 18—Thousands of Oregonians will have opportunity this week and next to meet and hear Harold E. Stassen, former governor of Minnesota and a leading candidate for the republican presidential nomination.

Stassen is coming to Oregon Friday for a four-day "get acquainted" tour which will take him to 14 cities in the state's four congressional districts as part of his pre-convention swing through the Pacific Northwest and down the Pacific coast, it was announced today by Robert A. Elliott of Portland, in charge of arrangements.

The big mid-Westerner's principal talk will be Friday evening before the 29th annual Oregon Press conference at Eugene. The conference is sponsored jointly by the School of Journalism of the University of Oregon and the Oregon Newspaper Publishers association.

Stassen will arrive at Salem by chartered Northwest Airlines plane at 9 a. m. Friday. Following a talk before the student body of Willamette university at 11 a. m., Stassen will visit Stayton, Scio, Lebanon and Sweethome. Brief receptions are planned in each of those cities.

Saturday Stassen will fly to Redmond, and will attend a luncheon of the Deschutes county republican committee at Bend, returning to Eugene to speak at 7:30 p. m. before the University of Oregon student body at a meeting open to the public. Stassen will spend Sunday in Portland, and no appearances have been scheduled for that day.

Monday's schedule calls for an automobile trip in the morning to Woodburn, Silverton and Albany, where Stassen will lunch with the Linn county republican committee; a reception at Brownsville in the afternoon; dinner at Corvallis with

the Benton county republican committee, and a talk before the student body of Oregon State college at 8 p. m.

U. S. Citizen Tried By Arabs

JERUSALEM, Feb. 18 (AP)—A National Broadcasting company correspondent said today he was arrested and tried yesterday by an Arab national guard court in Jerusalem.

Don Peretz of Sunnyside, N. Y., said in a story published by the Palestine Post today that he was freed "on condition that I never set foot in an Arab area again."

Peretz, an American Jew, gave an account of his experience, which said:

"I was arrested by the Arab national guard while going to the Jewish section of the city from the YMCA. It was halted by a group of armed Arabs who requested my identity card. Upon showing them by NBC card and U. S. army discharge papers, I was told they were inadequate, and my American passport was demanded. I did not have this with me."

Peretz wrote he was taken into a room under heavy guard and brought before the Jerusalem commander of the Arab national guard. A priest acted as interpreter.

"One of the first questions was: Are you Jewish? I replied, yes, I am an American Jew. It was then I began to be afraid."

"I was assured by the priest: 'We do not kill Jews because they are

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Shanghai Inflation Hits New High

SHANGHAI, Feb. 18 (AP)—Inflation spiraled to new and dizzy heights Tuesday.

The gold bar black market made the most spectacular rise. It went from \$360 per 10-ounce bar to \$700.

The dollar rose from 180,000 yuan to 215,000 yuan to \$1.

Commodities jumped more than 40 per cent.

Urges in gold prices was attributed to speculation—coupled with the government's relaxation of regulations permitting sales of ornamental gold. Goldsmiths were reopening shops closed for months.
