No Segregation McGrath told reporters a dozen or more negroes planned to attend the two dinners here. He said he could not order any segregation. Mrs. Johnston called the flareup "symbolic of party leaders' efforts to get minority votes through 'civil rights' proposals that led to threats of a southern bolt."

McGrath showed deep concern over the Wallace threat in his radio address. He said he thinks Wallace himself is "sincere" enough, but added: "The fact that the loudest applause for Henry Wallace comes from communists, communist fellow travelers and reactionary republicans causes me to believe that the bulk of Henry Wallace's support is coming from those whose basic allegiance is not to the American way of life."

Pair Off On Ski Journey

GOVERNMENT CAMP, Ore., Feb. 19 (AP)—Two skiers slipped down the slope southward from Summit forest guard station at 1 p. m. today, starting a 300-mile trip never before attempted. The forest service and the ski patrol had warned against it because of the possibility of accidents in a remote, inaccessible wilderness.

Jack Meissner, husky young trapper and resort worker who lives high in the Cascades, and Emery Woodall, experienced outdoorsman from Arlington, Va., said today they had no doubt they could safely follow the Cascade range summit from here to Crater lake.

As they checked through Summit guard station, each carried a 45-pound pack containing, in addition to food, a small tent, emergency ski repair equipment and red and yellow sheets with which to signal aircraft if in trouble. Meissner said he had arranged with the CAP at Eugene to fly over their route for regular checks.

The men expect to spend 30 days on the trip. They will pick up additional supplies at two points on the route where highways cross the mountains.

Meissner, who abandoned his original plan to go alone when the forest service objected, said he had been planning the trip for more than a year.

WTC Forester Heads Group

Clyde S. Martin, chief forester for Weyerhaeuser Timber company, Tacoma, Wash., has been elected president of the Society of American Foresters for the two-year term 1948-1949. Election was conducted by mail ballot of the members.

Martin succeeds Shirley W. Allen, professor of forestry at the University of Michigan, who was not a candidate for reelection. Paul M. Dunn was the only Oregon man elected on the council of the SAF which has nine members. Dunn is dean of the school of forestry, Oregon State college, Corvallis.

Hal H. Ogle, superintendent of Klamath Forest Protective association, has been named with five others to serve on the membership committee.

PORTLAND, Feb. 19 (AP)—Bengt Danielsson, Swedish sociologist who has crossed the Pacific ocean from Peru to the Polynesian islands on a raft, explored the Arctic, and investigated headhunters in the Amazon jungles, today expressed his opinion of the Pacific Northwest. "It is beautiful, like Sweden," said Danielsson, "except it has too many billboards, too many motorcars, and too many skirts worn too long."

Mill Accident Suit Filed

A lawsuit against the state industrial accident commission was filed in circuit court today on change of venue from Multnomah county. The suit was brought by William H. Fohli, employe of the Chiloquin Lumber company, for reversal of a decision of the accident commission denying him compensation for injuries received in a mill accident. Fohli received an injury to his arm April 29, 1947, at the mill and maintains he is 50 per cent disabled in that arm. The accident commission last December ruled otherwise, and has asked that the suit be dismissed. Fohli is represented by Ben Anderson of the Portland law firm of Lord, Anderson and Franklin.

Pelican City Man Faces Hearing

John Swartzfager, 69, of Pelican City, is in the county jail and due for a hearing on a charge of disorderly conduct in justice court this afternoon. He is accused of beating his wife, Nellie Swartzfager, who signed the complaint against him. Swartzfager was arrested yesterday afternoon on Main street by city police.

Tule Firm Gets Pumping Contract

Contract for installation of six pumping plants in the Coppock Bay area have been awarded by the bureau of reclamation to George R. Stacy of Tulelake. Cost of the project will run about \$125,000. The new pumping apparatus will be used to irrigate land not reached through the regular irrigation set-up.

Arabs To Get Two US Surplus Ships

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19 (AP)—The state department said today the embargo on arms shipments to the Palestine area doesn't affect the sale of two war-time landing craft to Saudi Arabia. The two vessels have been disarmed and a license for their export was granted before the embargo was placed in effect, officials told reporters. They are at Long Beach, Calif., undergoing overhaul at a shipyard. Reports from Long Beach said the converted LCIs recently were sabotaged. The 158-foot craft are due to sail this month via the Panama Canal for their home port of Jeddah, Arabia. They were purchased by the Arabian Economy and Thrift Co., Ltd., for use as cargo vessels.

Fire Destroys Portland Church

PORTLAND, Feb. 19 (AP)—A spectacular fire roared through Sunny-side Methodist church here today, flames shooting 50 feet above the roof shortly after a class of children marched from the building to safety. Two firemen were overcome by smoke during the hour and 15 minute battle to save the structure. An adjoining recreational hall was saved, but the interior of the church was destroyed at a loss of \$75,000. The blaze apparently started in the basement from an undetermined cause. A children's Bible class in the basement marched from the building shortly after the fire was discovered.

USBR Cools Down Offices

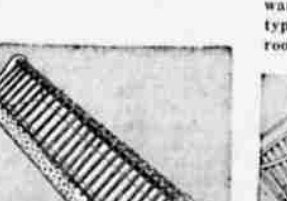

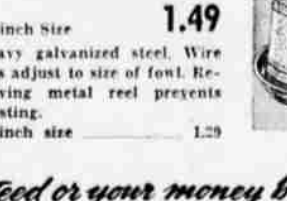

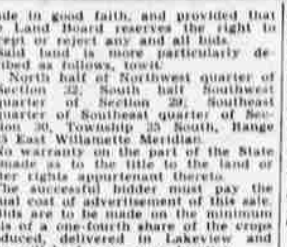
