

Army Planes Make Trips

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19 (AP)—B-29 Superfortresses are flying training missions from American bases in Germany to the Middle East.

Their course describes a careful half-circle to avoid the politically delicate area of the Balkans. However, the giant bombers do fly over Tel Aviv in Palestine on their way to Dharran in Saudi Arabia.

That huge wartime base is being used as a terminus by agreement with the Saudi Arabian government. The B-29s make the 3600-mile jump non-stop, headquarters of the strategic air command said today. The flights are part of a general training program designed to give air crews experience on long trips under various climatic conditions and to familiarize them with remote routes. The number of B-29s making the hops to the Middle East is comparatively small.

Massive Cattle Movement Seen

FRESNO, Calif., Feb. 19 (AP)—Mass movement of cattle within two ranges of the western San Joaquin valley to other states was predicted today by Fresno County Agricultural Commissioner John W. Dixon.

"The only thing preventing the shipments now is the snow on the ranges in Oregon and Idaho," Dixon said.

Some valley men are leasing grazing lands in the northern states for their cattle. Others are selling their herds outright to feeders, Dixon said.

Korean Deal Gains Heat

SEOUL, Feb. 19 (AP)—Lt. Gen. John R. Hodge today told Russia the man-handling of two American officers in Soviet-occupied North Korea was "an insult to the United States army."

Hodge is commander of the U. S. occupation zone in South Korea. He wrote Lt. Gen. G. P. Korotkov, the Russian commander, that he held Korotkov responsible for the incident at Pyongyang February 8.

Majors Darrel G. Costello and Richard C. Biggs were pushed around by Koreans and a camera was snatched from Costello. They were trying to watch a parade of the Russian-armed North Korean army. The army and a North Korean government were established by the Soviets in violation of international agreements. The Americans were on duty in Pyongyang as liaison officers.

Hodge told Korotkov in a formal note of protest: "I x x x insist that you give me adequate assurance such incidents will not happen again."

"It constituted an insult to the United States army as well as to its accredited representatives. In the meantime, this matter is being referred to my government for appropriate action."
