

# KUHS Cinder Hopefuls Out For Training

### Deller Will Field Experienced Squad For First Trials

Head Track Coach Paul Deller this week issued track bids to about 30 returning KUHS cinder veterans, and started the Pelicans out on their track and field season with a light workout.

Last night between 30 and 40 fledglings received equipment to begin practice, and workouts will begin in earnest within the next couple of days.

A number of old team members, as well as some new aspirants, are tied up in swimming, wrestling and basketball, but will report for action as soon as their respective seasons end. Deller expects to have a squad of about 70 working out in the near future.

Quite a formidable lineup is returning to the Motoc field oval, and what with the new candidates and the graduates of last year's B track team, the Pelicans might easily do pretty well for themselves this year. Returning in the dashes and hurdles will be Tommy Edwards and Bob Dodson, both members of the 1946 stellar relay team. Whitley Dorman and Chuck Brightman will be back for the mile and possibly other distances. Harry Clawson will return for the half-mile and is expected to be helped out in that category by a newcomer from Oregon City, Gy Newman, who reportedly made a circle for himself in the jumps will be Gary Dawes, John Stone and Don Zarosinski, while the weight department will likely be headed by Len Heaton, Jerry Schubert and Dick Young.

Several transfers are expected to augment the 40 outfit, along with the usual crop of fresh.

Coach Deller is casting a wary eye towards the opening meet with Ashland on March 27. It will be a dual meet, and should the Pelican hoopers go clear through the state tourney, at least four of the local thincats upon whom Pel fortunes at Ashland will likely rest will be tied up until a mesager five days before the Ashland date.

Zarosinski, Dorman, Brightman and Dawes will all be with the casaba outfit.

All keglers will be out to keep up the showing they made last year when they brought home the majority of prize money. At this time a year ago there were a couple of teams vying for top honors but 1947 proved the way to the now prospering Klamath Falls Moose Sports association which has taken over the handling of all sports.

Soon after the annual Eugene tournament more men and women became interested in sports and now that the year has passed, eight teams are ready for action.

There is no doubt that this bowling game is imbedded in the local lodge and has the biggest following of any city in the state.

Along with the kegling tournament will be a statewide meeting of officers and dignitaries of the Oregon State Moose. Activities will begin or have begun starting Friday night through Sunday.

Al Nyback, local business man and president of the Moose in the state of Oregon, has already left for the conference. G. B. Leach, present governor of the local lodge, and other officers of Klamath are expected to attend the meetings.

# Dixie Coaches Agree To Code

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Feb. 20 (AP)—Three powerful conferences—the Southern, the Southwest and the Southeastern—are in agreement on an interpretation of the NCAA's new code.

Delegates from the three leagues met for five hours yesterday after which Coach Bob Neyland of Tennessee, who presided, handed out a statement reading: "All representatives agreed to carry back to their conferences a recommendation that aid to any athlete from any source or in any form, be limited to actual institutional expense. This limitation would restrict aid even more than the NCAA code."

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# LOCAL A.A.U. QUINTET CHOSEN FOR TOURNEY

The team which will represent Klamath Falls and district 10 (Klamath Lake and Harney) counties in the state AAU basketball playoffs has been selected—11 players and a non-playing manager.

District 10 comprises three counties, but Harney and Lake have no independent basketball and left the matter up to Klamath.
