Truman Holds UN Makes Progress Despite Failure Of Russia To Cooperate

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (AP)—President Truman said today Russia's refusal to carry out United Nations decisions has raised a "disturbing" new problem. But despite the failure of the Soviet Union and its satellites to cooperate, "the United Nations is making headway," the chief executive told congress. He added: "The strengthening of the United Nations continues to be a cornerstone of the foreign policy of the United States."

Oil Exports Slashed Again

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (AP)—The commerce department Thursday slashed another 599,000 barrels of gasoline and fuel oil from the export quota through March, in order to save fuel for American homes. Taken together with a cut announced February 10, the reduction amounts to 24 per cent of the entire quantity of petroleum set aside for shipment overseas in January, February and March.

Poe Valley

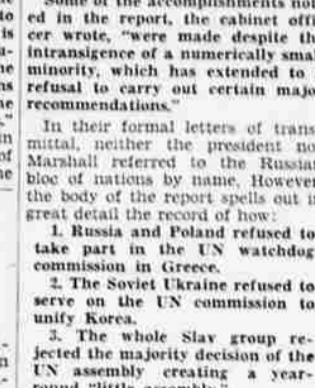
