During his absence Mahrt, who will make the trip by train, will be replaced by Deputy Woody Joe, who has worked for the local police upon occasion since last spring.

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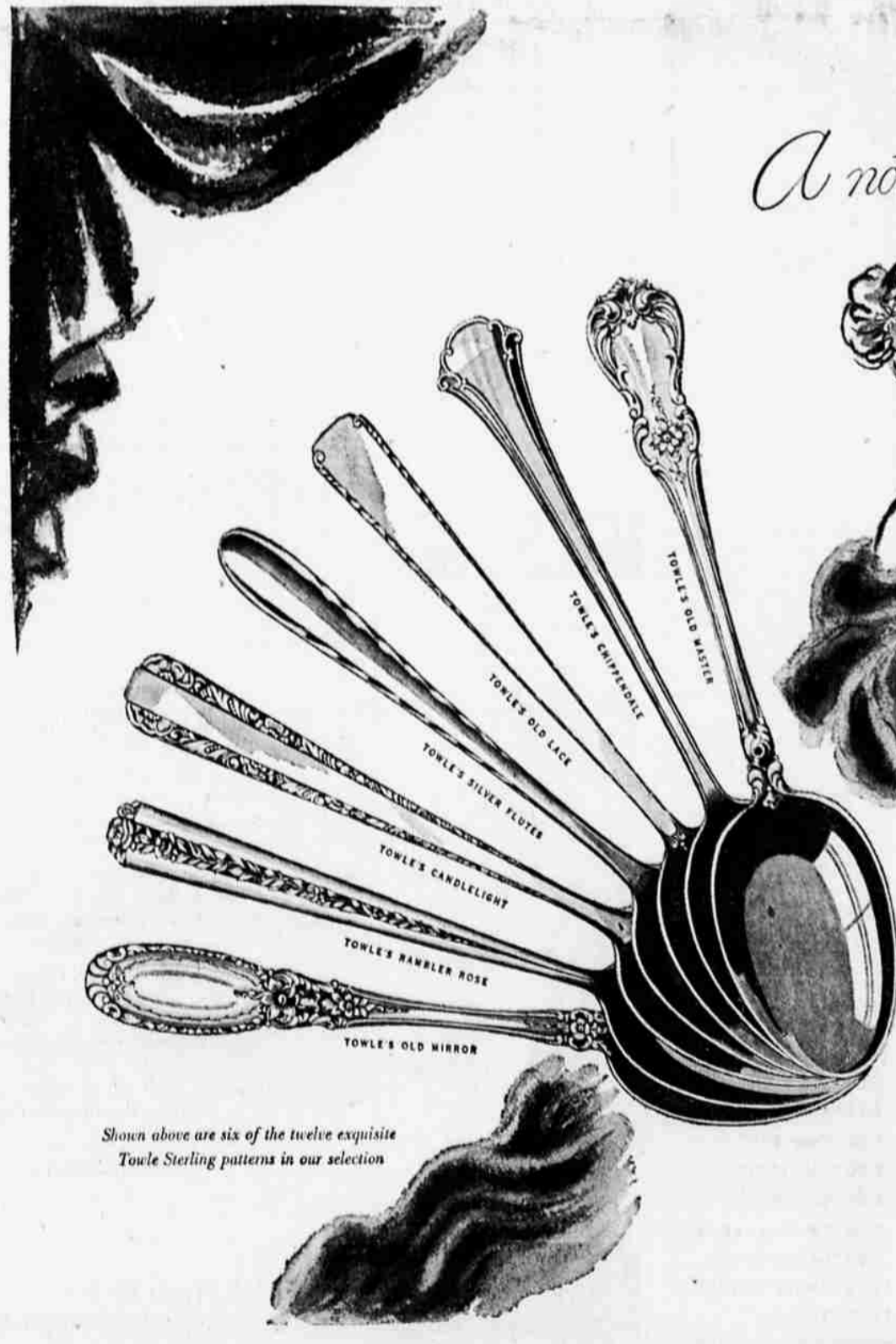
