

Diamond History Told By Speaker

The members of the Soroptimist club of Klamath Falls were held spellbound by a talk given by Art Reinhart on the history of diamonds. The Kohinour, one of the most famous of historical diamonds, left a path of bloodshed in its wake through the centuries until it finally became one of the crown jewels of Queen Victoria and is now on display in the Tower of London.

Diamonds were first discovered in India, later in Brazil, and then in South Africa under British government rule. At present, nearly all the diamonds come from Africa, and their marketing is completely controlled by a British marketing syndicate. Mr. Reinhart explained in detail how this syndicate kept the price of diamonds level in spite of fluctuating price cycles on all other commodities. Due to this control of prices, owners of diamonds are assured that their gems will not lose their value. He explained all the steps a diamond must pass through before the finished product is achieved.
