## Vet's Mail Bag

As a service to veterans in the community, this newspaper will publish an occasional column of news briefs from the veterans administration. For further information, veterans should contact or write their nearest VA contact office at Klamath Falls.

**Vets Not Required to Pay**  
Veterans are not required to pay attorneys or agents for representing them in monetary claims against the veterans administration, the VA has announced in answer to numerous recent requests.

Fees for such services, the VA said, are payable only by the agency itself and are deducted from the monetary benefit due the veteran at the time the claim is allowed.

Fees are fixed by statute at \$10 for an original claim and \$2 for a claim to obtain increased benefits. Any agent or attorney who charges

or attempts to charge any veteran for such services is subject to penal provisions of the law in addition to loss of his accreditation, the VA said.
