

City Fathers Told Off By Irate Citizens On Subject Of Dark, Muddy Street

City fathers were told off in no uncertain terms Tuesday night. A delegation of Plum street residents told the city council that it was high time to protest when the post office refuses to deliver mail along a street one block from the post office because of mud conditions.

Post office officials have notified residents that they will no longer deliver mail in that sector.

Residents presented a petition for paving Plum from 7th to 8th. Russell Duell, 737 Plum, told city officials that residents have tried unsuccessfully for a paving project for a long time.

City Engineer E. A. Thomas explained that a wide gap between cost of improvement and the assessed valuation of the property as well as the reluctance of one or two property owners to pay their share

Klement Gottwald, Czech Premier, Long Time Red

 Klement Gottwald, who emerged today as Middle Europe's newest dictator, is a veteran of a quarter century of the communist struggle for power.

Czechoslovakia's premier, now 51, sometimes is referred to as the nation's own copy of Joseph Stalin. He has been a tested servant of the Moscow line and one of the elite of Europe's communist leaders.

Gottwald was one of the 10 top-ranking communists who signed the 1943 declaration dissolving the communist (communist international). His name was first on the list.

Among the other signers were Georgi Dimitroff, now in complete control of Bulgaria; Maurice Thorez, militant communist leader in France; and Andrei Zhdanov, who in 1947 was to sign the Poland declaration setting up the communist, a successor to the communist.

Gottwald, a calm, deliberate man who bears some physical resemblance to Stalin, became premier of Czechoslovakia after the communist triumph in the first post-war election. The communists became the dominant party by capturing 38 per cent of the seats in parliament.
