New Head Named For Housing Unit

A new man will become head of the four federal housing projects in Klamath Falls March 16, replacing Austin Hayden who has been housing administrator here since March 16.

George A. Weeks Jr., of San Diego, will be the new PHA manager here, according to an announcement made by the San Francisco regional federal housing office.

Reason for the replacement was listed as a civil service regulation which required retention of employees with greater seniority when the staff is being reduced. The housing administration, the San Francisco office said, has been undergoing a reduction for several months on the Pacific coast and Weeks has been with PHA in a managerial capacity since October, 1943.

No mention was made by the San Francisco office of a probe into the housing administration here, a probe demanded by veterans organization and promised by the regional PHA office last week.

Weeks comes to Klamath Falls from San Diego where he was manager of a project of more than a thousand units. He will have charge of the four projects here, comprising 387 units.

Weeks is already in Klamath Falls and will spend the next two weeks on the projects with Hayden, familiarizing himself with the operation.

Name Changed—Mrs. Ralph Rust of the Professional Ambulance service advised The Herald and News today that name of the operation has been changed to City Ambulance service and that she would operate the ambulance herself in the future.
