

### Pair Fined For Red Jibe

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26 (AP)—Two men were fined \$100 each Wednesday for putting signs on the Russian embassy last summer saying "Murder, Inc." and "Beware, Spies Working."

They are Donald A. Lohbeck, 30, of St. Louis and the Rev. Oliver K. Goff, 33, Denver Baptist minister. Lohbeck once edited a paper published at Detroit by Gerald L. K. Smith.

Judge Jennings Bailey fined them. A jury in U. S. district court had convicted them of violating a law against displaying signs derogatory to a foreign government within 500 feet of its embassy.

Forrest Schickelkinder, 49, Marietta, O., was also charged in the case. He pleaded guilty. His sentence will be imposed after a probation officer makes recommendations.

### Woodrow Makes Himself At Home

CHARLESTON, S. C., Feb. 26 (AP)—Police today were looking for Woodrow—a man who, like Goldilocks, feels perfectly at home in other people's houses.

The man entered a Yonges island home this week while the family was away. He helped himself to a full meal, washed the dishes, set the table, and then went to bed.

Discovered by a neighbor's boy, the intruder departed with a pistol and \$5.

"Just say Woodrow was here and that I'll be back," he told the lad.

### Rice Enriching Proposal Vetoes

BAGUIO, P. I., Feb. 26 (AP)—A proposal to add vitamin B-1 to Asia's rice was opposed by Burma and the Philippines today at the United Nations food and agriculture organization meeting.

India proposed increasing the cereal's vitamin content as a means of combatting beri beri and other diseases arising from food deficiencies. Philippines representatives contended that each rice producing nation should decide whether rice should be enriched.

The meeting is preliminary to the opening of the world rice conference here Monday.

### Will Irwin Dies At Age Of 74

NEW YORK, Feb. 26 (AP)—Will Irwin, 74, author of some 30 volumes of fiction and non-fiction, magazine editor and World War I correspondent, died Tuesday.

In the 1920's, the newsman became acquainted with Herbert Hoover, also a Stanford alumnus. His biography of the 30th U. S. president was published in 1929. Other books included "A Reporter at Armageddon," "A House of Mystery," "Highlights of Manhattan" and "Christ or Mars."

### Willamette River Reaches Crest

PORTLAND, Feb. 26 (AP)—The Willamette river, which flooded lowlands in the Eugene and Albany areas briefly this week, crested here Wednesday at a safe six feet below flood stage.

The river mounted only to 19.4 feet at Salem, slightly under the flood level. At Oregon City, the water overflowed, and the locks were closed today. They probably will reopen tomorrow.

### DEATH

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 26 (AP)—A 70-year-old widow, Mrs. Augusta Cooney, was hanging out laundry on the roof of her apartment house yesterday. A kitten came up to play. Mrs. Cooney stooped over to pet it, stumbled over a firewall ledge and fell 30 feet to her death in a lightwell.

joining with the Russians in a demand for PARTITION (splitting up) of the Holy Land between the Jews and the Arabs, we seem now to be trying to talk United Nations into reconsidering the split-up proposal.

A minor war is mushrooming up in Palestine. Even minor wars are dangerous these days—like a cigarette butt in dry prairie grass. You never can tell how far they'll spread. The little war needs to be stopped before it grows into a big one.

But stopping it will take force. The British are getting out. Other than the British, only we and the Russians have the necessary military force to stop the Palestine war before it gets too big to handle.

HERE is our dilemma: If we let the Russians get into the Near and the Middle East with an ARMY, how are we ever going to get them out?

### WE learned at Yalta that once the Russians get their hooks into something they want they seldom let go.

That knowledge worries us in Palestine.

### Pile Driver Men Threaten Walkout

PORTLAND, Feb. 26 (AP)—A union official said Wednesday that McNary dam pile drivers will walk off the job unless their wage demands are granted by Friday night.

The pile drivers want a 25-cent-an-hour wage increase. George D. Griffith, union secretary, said the union would meet here Friday night to take action.

The wage demand is being considered by a three-man arbitration board. Negotiations, under way three months, have settled all other issues.

### HST Relaxes At Sub Base

KEY WEST, Fla., Feb. 26 (AP)—President Truman began today what may be his last extended vacation before the 1948 presidential campaign.

He relaxed at his favorite vacation spot—the naval submarine base here—after a Caribbean trip which carried him to the largely negro Virgin Islands.

There was no word from the temporary White House at the commandant's house, of reaction to the trip, which came while democratic governors and congressmen were protesting his civil rights proposals to congress.

These proposals include poll tax repeal, passage of anti-lynching legislation and enactment of a prohibition against segregation of passengers in interstate carriers.

The president, still unannounced, is regarded by democratic headquarters strategists as a certainty for the democratic nomination in the 1948 election.

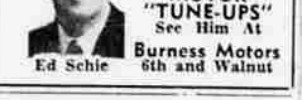
### Sugar Beet Men Sign New Contract

BOISE, Ida., Feb. 26 (AP)—Southern and Southwestern Idaho sugar beet growers signed a 1948 contract last night after two days of negotiations with the Amalgamated Sugar company.

Spokesmen for the growers said the new contract was "the best we ever had."

If present sugar prices continue, representatives of the growers and processor said growers would receive approximately \$11 per ton under the new agreement.

This payment, together with the government payment of approximately \$2.50 per ton, would return to the grower between \$13 and \$14 per ton, they said.
