

# Chiloquin Loses First Round; Two Chosen For Hall Of Fame

## Jax Capture Initial Match Toward Belt

A tall quintet of Redkins from Jacksonville across the mountains sang the first chorus last night, winning the initial heat of the district 5-B high school basketball playoff 34 to 25 from the Chiloquin Panthers. The game—played on the Oregon Vocational school gym—was never close.

The two-out-of-three series goes on again tonight at OVS at 8:15. Another win by Jax would finish it and put the Redkins into the Arlington state tournament, but should the Panthers win the third game of the playoff would be moved to the Camp White gym at Eagle Point.

Jacksonville looked to have the necessary punch last night. The Redkins are remarkably tall and are good ball handlers. Also they apparently found the king-size OVS gym more to their liking than did Chiloquin.

**CLOSE ONES OUT**

The Panthers were missing the close ones. They were getting as many and as clear shots as the opposition but the ones that could go either in or out were going out.

Jacksonville hopped off to an eight-point lead in the first two minutes of play and never lost it. Guard Donald Wendt went up in the air three times for three consecutive baskets and Harlan Bolle contributed one.

Chiloquin went six minutes without a mark of any sort, until Claude Baird hit a free throw. Jackie Jones also got a free one to end the first quarter at 10-2 for Jax. Only three minutes remained in the second period when the Panthers got their first basket, a long whirling shot from outside the key by Gillis Hannigan.

**LITTLE FLURRY**

The Panthers got together a little flurry to cut the Jax lead to 16-9 by halftime.

Jacksonville wasn't fast and wasn't hot, but the Redkins were deliberate. The Panthers, who usually can be counted on for one blazing spree per game, never hit a hot streak either.

The nearest the Panthers got to a rally was along in the fourth quarter when Dick Sauer was shooting them from the right of the key. He got three baskets and missed several others. Sauer was high for Chiloquin at nine points, while Wendt counted a dozen for the Redkins.

Jacksonville had a couple of players—Center Don Harris and Guard Carl Hueners—who towered over the small Panthers with the result that Chiloquin never got a jump-ball tip all night and very few rebounds.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 27 (AP)—Having passed the high water, Washington State College cagers looked forward confidently today to squelching Oregon State's particular brand of "hell."

The title-seeking Cougars arrived here eight hours late last night after bussing in from Eastern Oregon. Their train, delayed by a flood, was halted at Wallula, Ore.

Although Coach Jack Friel shrugged off any idea that his squad might suffer from the jaunt, he wasted no time in hustling the team to the gymnasium to work out the kinks.

The two-game series opening tonight could make or break the title aspirations of either Washington State or Oregon State. And a sweep for either club would spell a virtual finish to the University of Washington's still mathematically possible tie.

Washington State now leads the parade by a half game with OSC a similar margin out in front of Washington. The Cougars still must meet Oregon Monday and Tuesday, as must Oregon State, in a single contest. Washington still has two with troublesome Idaho.

## Nichols Far In Lead Of Northwest Cagers

Central Washington college tucked a "Do not disturb" sign on the basket last week and convinced Pacific Lutheran's high Harry McLaughlin it was meant for him.

For the only time this season, the Vince Hanson of Washington State was held scoreless. Even that goose-egg, however, couldn't pull McLaughlin out of top spot in the Northwest basketball scoring race. The tall desayde (1) collected enough points in two other games to run his season total to 480 points and (2) to run his Washington intercollegiate conference total to 275. This cracked the record of 260 he set last season.

Just shy of having 100 points' edge of Jim Johnson of Willamette, High Harry has made a runaway race of the scoring contest. There was a slight shuffling in the lower brackets, with the return of Washington's Jack Nichols to the top ten as the chief item of interest. Gros-Jacques of Portland tumbled from the list.

Nichols also moved back into first place in the northern division tally chase and became the first man in the loop to reach the 200 mark. Vince Hanson of Washington State was in third place behind Oregon's Roger Wiley, 47 points back of Nichols and nearly 100 below his own division record of 253.

Hanson has four games left, Wiley three and Nichols two. With WSC meeting Oregon State tonight (Friday) and tomorrow while the other teams are idle, Hanson is almost sure to catch Wiley but could haul down Nichols only by a sensational performance.

McLaughlin leads the field in field goals and free throws as well as total points. Only he and Cliff Crandall of OSC have hit more than 100 from the charity line.

## Herb Pennock, Traynor Voted For Memorial

NEW YORK, Feb. 27 (AP)—The late Herb Pennock and Harold (Pie) Traynor were voted into baseball's Hall of Fame today by the Baseball Writers association. Their names will be enrolled in the Cooperstown, N. Y., shrine alongside 46 others who were so honored in previous years.

Pennock, the great lefthanded pitcher who died January 30 en route to a National league meeting in New York, led the candidates with 94 votes. Traynor, Pittsburgh third baseman for 17 years, polled 93 votes. According to the rules, 75 per cent of the votes cast or 91 votes were required for election. More than 300 writers were eligible to vote. A total of 121 votes were cast.

A total of 136 players received votes but many of them were ineligible. Either they were still active in 1947 or they already had been named.

**SIMMONS SHORT**

Al Simmons, Philadelphia Athletics coach who hit 334 in a major league career dating from 1924 to 1944, followed Pennock and Traynor with 69 votes—31 short of election.

Charley Gehring, famous Detroit second baseman and Bill Terry, former New York Giants' first baseman and manager, tied for fourth with 52 votes. Paul Waner, one of the better hitters in the history of the game, polled 51. Slugger Jimmy Foxx had 50.

Pennock was one of the best lefthanded pitchers of all time. Formerly with the Yankees, Philadelphia's A's and Boston Red Sox, he was rounding out a fifth year as general manager of the Phillies when he died.

**GOOD IN SERIES**

Over a 22-year span he won 243 big league games, including five without a defeat in world series competition.

Traynor, now a scout with the Pirates, broke into the majors with Pittsburgh in 1920 after starting at Portsmouth, Va. Shipped to Birmingham in 1921, he again finished the season with the Bucs and remained with them as player manager and scout until 1943. Over that period his lifetime major league batting average was .320.

One of the better third basemen in the game over a span of 17 years, Traynor managed the Pirates from June, 1934, through 1939.

## Dimout May Pinch

Whether Northern California's drought-born "dimout" will have any effect on night baseball in Klamath Falls this spring and summer is still an unanswered question. But as matters stand right now it probably will not.

However, the six Far West league teams located in California probably will have to do some schedule revising in favor of twilight ball.

The California PUC emergency order cuts electrical power consumption for sports 50 per cent and forbids turning on lights before 8 p. m. If continued on through the summer, that order apparently would slice the Far West night schedule for Santa Rosa, Marysville, Willows, Redding, Pittsburg and Oroville in half.

Sam Ritchey, Copco manager here, said that no restrictions are placed on sports lighting in Oregon so the local night schedule probably will not be disrupted unless voluntarily as a conservative measure.

Oregon has made no move to follow California on a dimout.

Jerry Donovan, president of the Far West league, has called directors for a meeting in regard to changing the already-adopted schedule. Joe Devine, prey of the California State league, says his loop will shift to twilight ball.

The change may be greatly detrimental to the Far West league because the circuit is slow one and is looking forward to the lure of night baseball getting the league on its feet financially.

## DeLong Is Score Ace

NEW YORK, Feb. 27 (AP)—Nate DeLong of River Falls, Wis., State continues to top the small college basketball sceneries. His eye-opening average for 19 games is 27 points.

These figures, compiled by the national collegiate athletic bureau, including games through February 21. They do not include DeLong's recent 72-point effort in one night.

Eppa Rixey of Kenyon is second to the leader with a 25.4 average followed by Frank Keath of Elizabethton at 24.7 points. John Wilson of Anerson with 23.3 and Newell Oliver of Rio Grande with a 22.6 mark round out the top five. Oliver actually has scored the most points, 633, but his team has played 28 games to 19 for DeLong.

Northwest teams figure in the small college statistics three times. Pollard of Lewis & Clark ranks second in the average number of fouls committed per game while the LC team ranks third in that regard. Pollard has 97 infractions in 24 starts, an average of 4.04 a game; LC has racked up 537 miscues in 24 games, an average of 22.4 a contest.

The third Northwest representative is Gonzaga whose efforts in holding 27 opponents to a cumulative 1090 points gives them a defensive average of 40.4 a game. The figure is third nationally.

Jersey Joe, beaten in a split decision fight last December, announced last night that he had agreed to meet the brown bomber at the Yankee stadium June 23, and would place his name on the contract in the offices of the Twentieth Century Sport club in New York.

Louis, in England for a series of exhibition bouts, previously had affirmed a return engagement against the 34-year-old Camden, N. J., man who twice floored him in their previous engagement.
