Construction On Tulelake Community Presbyterian Church Scheduled April 15

TULELAKE, Feb. 26 — Plans offered by Sheldon Brumbaugh, Klamath Falls architect for the new Tulelake Community Presbyterian church, were accepted by the church board this week and actual construction will get under way by April 15.

The new plans were drawn to conform with the \$50,000 limit decided on by the board after those for a stone structure drawn by Frederick M. Ely, Salem architect, were discarded when it was disclosed that a masonry building would exceed the budget.

The building will be of frame construction and will incorporate the present structure, eliminating the necessity of disposing of this building which the church has outgrown.

Baptists To Open Building

The grand opening of the new educational building of the First Baptist church, N. 8th and Washington, is scheduled for Sunday, March 14.

Since last October, construction has been under way and the whole project is expected to be completed and furnished for the opening date. Pastor C. C. Brown states that the new departments are being equipped with the latest fixtures and furnishings. There will be three nursery divisions with separate superintendents. The other departments will be rearranged and new workers added to the staff. The Sunday school organization will staff about 35 teachers, and the whole school will be graded and departmentized.

Ellis B. Evans, Sunday school secretary of California, will bring a corps of workers to the local church for a week of enlargement campaign. Courses of study are scheduled for all groups and all teachers and officers are to be especially trained for their work. More than 300 are expected in attendance on the opening day.

Morning worship with Holy Communion will be at 11 o'clock this Sunday at Klamath Lutheran church, Cross and Crescent streets. Rev. H. J. Thorpe, pastor, will preach the sermon, "What Is Truth?"

The choir will sing "Were You There?" by H. T. Burleigh. Mrs. Arthur Denton will accompany at the organ.

Sunday school with Bible classes will be at 9:45 a. m. The Boy Scouts will meet Monday at 7 p. m. at the church, and the Ladies Aid will meet at 2 p. m. Tuesday in the church parlors.

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Episcopal Presiding Bishop To Broadcast On Sunday

On Sunday, February 29, substantially every member of the Episcopal church will hear the voice of the presiding bishop, the Rt. Rev. Henry Knox Sherrill, by means of radio. In Klamath Falls the members of the congregation of St. Paul's Episcopal church will sit in their pews and at exactly 11:32 a. m. the presiding bishop's voice will be heard over station KFJL, telling the needs of war-devastated countries in Europe and Asia, and urging Episcopal church members everywhere to accept their duty and privilege of helping suffering millions. The same scene and the same message will be repeated in thousands of Episcopal churches all over the country, at the same time.

The Episcopal church gave more than a million dollars in 1947 through the presiding bishop's fund for world relief, and it intends to raise the same amount, or more, in 1948. The entirely new use of radio opens what is expected to be a very brief and highly successful campaign.

At the Sunday service, February 29, when Bishop Sherrill's ten-minute address ends, the rector of St. Paul's church, the Rev. Wissambach, will tell his people how they may have a part in this program of aid for the distressed, through the presiding bishop's fund. Then the opportunity will be given for both immediate gifts and short-time pledges. At national church headquarters in New York City it was stated recently that "1,600,000 people can raise \$1,000,000 for the presiding bishop's fund for world relief in ONE DAY if each parish and mission will do its share."

The radio address is "live," that is, it is given by Bishop Sherrill in New York at the time it is heard, with the exception of some remote places where the radio hook-up is impossible. In such instances, electrical transcriptions and phonograph records will be used.

Additional McNary Dam Funds Seen

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27 (AP)—Belief that the senate will boost funds for McNary dam from the \$20,000,000 approved by the house to \$40,000,000 was expressed today by Rep. Angell (R-Ore.).

Angell told the house he was not attempting to change their bill, but thought the senate would increase the allocation. He declared \$40,000,000 was needed for McNary dam work during the next fiscal year to prevent a year's delay in completion. A power shortage, he said, makes quick completion of such projects essential.

Presbyterian Church Plans Special Day

The First Presbyterian church, 6th and Pine streets, will join with the entire denomination in the observance of Laymen's Sunday, February 29, at 11 a. m. The message of the day will consist of an address by Philip S. Hitchcock, Presbyterian elder, who recently was one of two Oregon delegates to a national Presbyterian laymen's conference, held in the Palmer house, Chicago, February 12-14.

The purpose of the Chicago meeting, which furnishes the basis for Hitchcock's address, was that of organizing a permanent national council of Presbyterian men. This council, which in its program will reach 800,000 Presbyterian men, is headed by Charles J. Turck, president of McAlester college, St. Paul, Minn.

Leadership of the organizing conference included President Turck, Dr. John A. Mackay, president of Princeton Theological seminary, John Foster Dulles, leader in sessions of the United Nations, and the Rev. Louis H. Evans, D. D., pastor of Hollywood Presbyterian church. The membership of the Chicago conference consisted of 370 laymen, from 40 Presbyteries in 44 states, the District of Columbia and five foreign states. These men represented many professions: lawyers, dentists, teachers, college presidents,

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
